A tribute to Mary 1914-2017

Mary Creamer, who was the town's Boston Post Cane recipient honoring Whitefield's oldest resident, died Dec. 28, 2017. She was 103 years old.

The Whitefield Historical Society presented the certificate at a small ceremony in Mary's home in February 2010.

She was born March 26, 1914, the daughter of Jason and Myrtie (Wright) Edgerly, and spent her early years living in Augusta near where the airport is located today. At age 5 or 6, Mary moved with her family to a small farm on the Thayer Road, near the southern end of Crocker Avenue.

Leaving a large modern house with running water and electricity in the city to live in a country Cape illuminated by kerosene lamps was a challenge, she said at the time she received the Post Cane.

"We were scared," Creamer said, referring to herself and her two brothers in their new home. "Whitefield didn't have many people. We didn't even have a snowplow."

Between 1920 and 1922, no classes were held at the Plains school, the district where

the Edgerlys lived, so Mary boarded with the Ernest Dunton family in Kings Mills. She felt homesick, attending first and second grades five days a week in the schoolhouse there, and looked for-

ward to Friday. After school on that day, she walked part of the four-mile distance home with the Crocker children, who lived halfway up Crocker Avenue. At their house she met her mother, and together they walked the rest of the way.

In 1933 she married James Creamer, and the couple had a daughter, Betty Grady, who has shared a home on Head Tide Road with her mother for many years.

Mary, a homemaker who credited hard work for a good life, spent many enjoyable hours caring for her yard and gardens, especially her beloved dahlias. She remained active in recent years doing outside work, including shoveling snow, and looked forward to visits from family and friends, according to an obituary (Kennebec Journal, Jan. 3, 2018).

"Whitefield Collaborative Problem-Solving Committee"

As a result of the Jan. 11 Sheepscot Valley Regional School Unit Board of Directors meeting, a committee of twenty individuals was formed to identify and address the concerns brought forth by the community regarding Whitefield School. At that heavily attended Jan. 11 Board meeting, Whitefield resident and former Board member, Joan Morin, offered her experience in conflict management. Joan has worked for Maine Education Association as an advocate for 21 years. She will lead the "Whitefield Collaborative Problem-Solving Committee" through the process of identifying the issues and building consensus for resolution of those identified issues.

The Committee is made up of 8 Whitefield parents and community members, 6 Whitefield staff members, RSU 12 Superintendent and the Special Education Director, and the 3 Whitefield Board members. By receiving and giving information to the larger respective groups of concerned individuals within our Whitefield community, it is hoped that the Committee will be able to work towards positive solutions to the issues raised by parents and community members at the November Educational Forum and recent RSU 12 Board meetings. The first meeting held January 23 was a training session for all committee members in the process of Collaborative Problem Solving. As the committee moves forward in discussions concerning the issues, there will be future information provided about its progress.

Summary of recent Select Board activity

In preparation for the 2019 budget, the Board reviewed a salary survey for town office staff for towns in Maine with a similar population. It is clear from that survey that the Administrative Assistant and Treasurer in the Whitefield Town Office are below the pay of their peers. The board will recommend increases at the March Town Meeting. The board also reviewed current job descriptions and reassigned the treasurer role to Darlene Beaulieu. Both Aaron Miller and Darlene do municipal government work that is very specialized. As town officials around Maine retire at a more rapid rate, municipalities are finding it very difficult to recruit replacements.

The Board heard a presentation from Lincoln County TV (LCTV) which serves many towns in the county. Towns use LCTV for special events, select board, planning board, town meetings, concerts and sports. I was told by the chair of the Damariscotta Select Board that using LCTV at board meetings has increased citizen understanding of town issues as well as participation in meetings. The Board and budget committees will be reviewing the fees and discussing whether to include LCTV in the 2019 budget.

Several citizens attended a recent board meeting with concerns about winter road conditions. David Spicer, our plowing contractor, and his staff attended also. Spicer proposed several changes; particularly more attention to major roads like RT. 218. David Boynton, Road Commissioner and former plowing contractor, pointed out that Whitefield has a lot more miles, but spends less than surrounding towns. Our current contract with David Spicer expires this year, and we will be going out to bid.

The road committee has proposed a slight decrease in spending for 2019 which would keep us on track with the 10-year plan approved several years ago. The plan and the ongoing work of the committee have transformed the maintenance of town roads. The plan puts more emphasis on preventive maintenance such as ditching, brushing and culvert replacement and a more scientific approach to paving. Committee members Dennis Merrill, Ed Mooney, Mike McMorrow, Erik Ekholm and Frank Ober are also investigating a needed repair or replacement of a large culvert on south Hunts Meadow Road. This will be an expensive project, and the Board and budget committee will discuss a "set aside" to put away funds for the project which may or may not be done next year. These funds would be taken from town surplus.

Erik Ekholm, Dennis Merrill, Frank Ober and Aaron Miller have spent many hours planning for and implementing improvements in the Town Office. The improvements include a more ergonomic counter for the front office staff designed and built by Erik. Other changes include improved insulation, new heat pumps to heat and cool the space and virtually eliminate the need for oil, and new lighting, flooring and ceiling tiles. Thanks to the volunteer hours from this team, the cost was way lower than it could have been. The Board will also consider adding a generator. As you may know, the office had to close for several days after the October wind storm.

Town Meeting will be held at 10am, Saturday March 17. We encourage you to attend and participate. Ballot voting will take place from 4 to 8 the day before, Friday March 16.



NJHS NEEDS YOUR HELP

In the summer of 2014, while looking for areas to expand NJHS service learning, I stumbled upon the Preemie Project. In 2015 we began making Scent Hearts for the NICU at Maine Medical Center. Since then, our small group has provided over 1,000 hearts to the hospital.

The Scent Hearts are made of fabric, often flannel or cotton, and are sewn in the shape of a heart. They are given to parents who have children in the NICU by hospital staff. In turn, the parents wear these hearts against their skin for a period of time and the hearts pick up their scent. In the event that the parent has to leave the NICU, the heart can be placed in the incubator leaving a familiar scent to comfort the infant.

For the 2017-18 school year, our student membership is at its highest point with 20 members. We need the help of the community to get hearts made. Please contact me at 242-4289 or kmccor-mick@svrsu.org if you can sew hearts with us.

Also this year we have added to our Preemie Project. We have solicited people from communities near and far to knit or crochet tiny hats for these babies.
