Whitefield Town Meeting Information

A town meeting is a form of direct democratic rule, used in portions of the United States, principally New England, since the 17th century. In a town meeting, members of a community come together to leg-

islate policies, plans and budgets for local government.

We are fortunate to have that form of government here in Whitefield. We hope you will join us and participate in the discussions and voting. Those that have attended in the past can tell some great stories about past differences of opinion and controversies. It may be no different this year. Come and see.

SIGNIFICANT WARRANT ARTICLES:

- -Fire Department budget: For many years, Scott Higgins and his staff have requested no budget increase. This year, a reasonable increase is recommended.
- -Administrative wages and benefits: The board surveyed similar sized towns around

the state and determined that wages for the Administrative Assistant and for the Treasurer/Tax Collector are well below the market. Also, many town personnel are retiring around the state and towns are finding it difficult to recruit young people. The town has been using the Affordable Care Act (ACA) for staff health insurance. Given the ACA uncertainty, a relatively high out of pocket private insurance plan is recommended.

-Summer Roads: The summer roads budget is down somewhat, but continues to implement the Road Committee ten-year plan. The town recommends setting aside \$50,000 from surplus to begin funding an expensive culvert repair or replacement on the South Hunts Meadow Rd.


Update on Coopers Mills Dam

The removal of Coopers Mills Dam is on track for this summer. The project, a partnership between Whitefield and the Midcoast Conservancy, Atlantic Salmon Federation, and The Nature Conservancy, has made great strides towards the actual work of taking the dam out and installing the dry hydrant system. As with any big project, there are a lot of 'moving parts' that all have to fit together before work can start. Those parts are now falling into place.

The dam qualified for listing on the federal and state registers of historic places, so a lengthy process was undertaken to document it in its current condition and gather information for historic engineering records. That is now complete and state and federal historic agencies have finished their reviews. Final plans for the removal of the dam and putting in the dry hydrants are complete. Agreements with abutting landowners have been signed.

Negotiations are underway with the contractor chosen for the work. For the project, the partners needed permits from the Army Corps of Engineers, the Maine Department of Environmental Protection, and

(NOAA). The state DEP permit is in place, while the Federal and Planning Board permits are being reviewed. With the assistance of the Whitefield Dam Committee, work is also under-

way in developing informational

signage for the site.

Sometime early this summer, the partners plan to hold a public meeting to go over how the project will be built – or rather, removed.

Town Meeting Cont. from Pg. 1 - Winter Roads: With our current multiyear plowing contract expiring, the town will be going out to bid for winter road maintenance. Not knowing who the successful bidder will be and the price at the time of budget preparation, the town recommends a significant increase in the budget to avoid a circumstance where the bids come in higher than budget. We hope to have the bidding complete by town meeting to have voters finalize a number.

- -Town Office renovations: The \$29,000 in renovations budgeted in the current year to upgrade the town office are nearing completion. However, after a week without power in the town office after the October storm has led to plan to install a generator.
- -Overall, the town's proposed expenditures for FY19 are relatively flat, but not knowing the RSU 12 or Lincoln County tax amounts, it is too early to predict tax rates.
- -Revenue budget: For the first time in many years, the town recommends budgeting all town sources of revenue to reduce taxes, rather than having unbudgeted revenues create a surplus to reduce taxes in the following year.

Tim Chase grew up in Whitefield in the house currently occupied by his sister Jane on the Mills Road. After a couple of years in the Army, Tim married Martha and they now live in the beautiful white colonial at the top of Grand army Road. Tim spent most of his year working for BIW but after

retirement opened Whitefield Dry kiln. Tim has always been active in town, spending three years on the Select Board and four on the Planning Board.

In 1986 Tim starting making syrup in a rock pit when their four sons were

young. With help from Martha, the boys and their grandchildren, they now make between twenty and forty gallons a year depending on weather conditions. While Tim collects and boils the sap from his own trees, St. Denis, Christie Mitchell and the Earl Copper property, Martha does the bottling and labeling. They sell their products at the North Whitefield Superette and at their home on Maine Maple Sunday. The Alna Store uses their syrup for cooking.

Every year the Maine Maple Producers, an association of 160 producers

and manufacturers holds a contest at their annual meeting which is part of the Maine Agriculture Show in January. The criteria include density, color, clarity and flavor. Contestants chose which color category to enter. Taste can be affected by sap buckets, late season sap, products used for defoaming such as canola oil or butter, burning and even

the soap used to clean equipment at the end of the season. Great diligence is required.

In January, Tim entered his syrup in the amber category and won first prize. As if that wasn't enough, Tim won the trophy for best of show which includes all of the syrup types. Congratulations to Tim and Martha and their family helpers. You can taste their award winning syrup on Maine Maple Sunday on March 25th.
