## Local politics; step up to the plate

Let's be honest, when someone is considering a run for any political office or committee, one has to consider the consequences of such a decision, because, quite frankly, at one time or another no politician or public servant is safe from being a target. However, let's consider the benefits, both individually and to your community as a whole. If no one stepped forward to lead, imagine the chaos. If no one ever took a position, nothing would get done. Like it or not, leaders are, at times, just like the guy who comes up to bat, tied game, two outs, last inning. You're a hero if you hit, you're a bum if you strike out, but most people respect you because you stepped up to the plate and took a swing.

We thought it would be helpful to those who might consider a run for one of the town's elected offices to briefly talk about what it's like to be on one of the town boards, the Select Board, Planning Board and School Board.

I recently spoke with Tony Marple, chair of the Select Board and asked him why he steps up every day to serve this community. He said, "I like this unique town and want to help." I asked him what qualifications a candidate would need to run for the board. He responded, "It takes a while to learn the dynamics of town government and only the staff understand all the details. We stay out of left or right wing political ideology, because our



job is just to maintain and improve town services and infrastructure, balanced with trying to keep our property taxes relatively low compared to most towns in our region. We spend a lot of time working with families who have difficulty paying their taxes so they don't lose their property." There are five selectmen who currently meet weekly. Tony commented, "The time commitment can be as much as eight hours a week if you're retired, but if you have a full time job it needn't be that much." Board positions are for three years. There are two positions open on the Board of Selectmen to be filled at the upcoming election in March.

I next spoke with Planning Board chair, Jim Torbert. The fact that Jim has served on the Board for 8 years tells me he enjoys his work. When asked what prompted him to serve on the Planning Board, he responded, "I have a concern about the future of the town, that it will grow and prosper in an orderly way. The Planning Board is the place to make that happen." He went on to say anyone who runs for the Planning Board should be, "Willing to serve the town in constructive ways in order to build a real neighborhood environment." The Planning Board is made up of five members each serving three-year terms. The Board is charged with mediating land use issues, reviewing applications and development of ordinances. There are three positions on the Planning Board to be filled at the March election.

Terri Blair is one of three town representatives to the RSU School Board. I spoke with her recently about her duties on the Board. She explained the meetings are monthly and members can elect to serve on individual committees, i.e., curriculum or finance. She admits, "There is a learning curve when you are a new member, terms to learn, procedures to follow and people to get to know." She said, "I found it to be a great group of people who have differences of opinion, but with one common goal in mind; the best public school experience we can provide." When asked why she agreed to serve, she said, "I chose to be on the Board because I felt with multiple children in the school I wanted to do my best at attempting to have some input into their educational environment. It has in turn given me a unique perspective on the school and the district that I have found invaluable. The Board members work diligently and care deeply about the district and its students." There will be one three-year term and one two- year term open for election in March.

The common denominator for all three of the elected officials I spoke with is commitment and willingness to serve. Every one has had a unique experience, learned on the job and served our community in invaluable ways. Every one has stepped up to the plate and taken a swing. Nomination papers can be picked up at the town office and are due at the town office by January 15<sup>th</sup>.


## **Reminders from Whitefield Town Office**

## **Broadband Grant Helps Whitefield Committee**

The Whitefield Economic Development Committee has been working to improve broadband service to the town for the last two years. Their work puts the town in an advantageous position since most of the work has already been completed for the



first phase. \$38,675 has already been granted to the Lincoln County Regional Planning Commission by ConnectME. At least seven towns have been invited to participate in the joint planning effort.

A Phase One planning grant of \$6,825 will help towns complete work on mapping, digital literacy, meeting with providers and surveys by January 15, 2019. The Whitefield Economic Development Committee has completed the requirements for Phase One, but wish to ask Whitefield businesses to take part in an improved survey of their broadband use.

An appeal by email will be made to Whitefield businesses in hopes that they will complete the survey either by paper or Survey Monkey before a deadline of January 4. Supporting the survey will help Whitefield complete Phase One. A survey of Whitefield residents has already been completed.

Those towns that complete Phase One will become eligible to participate in a Phase Two infrastructure planning grant of \$31,850.
