Whitefield Town Meeting

About 65 people attended the March 16 town meeting, and as people mentioned in several discussions, most attendees were older residents. Since some had difficulty hearing speakers, the town may return to having young people hand out microphones to people wishing to speak as it was suggested.

Before the voting on warrant articles began, several people made brief presentations.

Town Clerk Darlene Beaulieu presented the election results including the election of Lise Hanners and Keith Sanborn to the Select Board, Marianne Marple, Glenn Angell ant Steve Sheehy to the Planning Board and the write-in votes of Steve Smith, Jr and Lynette Conroy to two of the vacant White-field seats on the RSU 12 Board. A week later, the Select Board appointed Christine LaPado-Breglia to the third RSU board vacancy.

Darlene also encouraged residents to provide their email addresses or sign up on the town website to allow improved communications on town matters.

Sue McKeen gave an update on the library and fundraising for the purchase and renova-



tions of the Grange.

Planning Board chair Jim Torbert recognized Judy Maldovan for the many years of volunteer service taking minutes for the Planning Board.

Fire Chief Scott Higgins recognized retiring Lynn Talacko for his 35 years of dedicated service as EMS Director.

Select Board member Charlene Donahue gave kind words of appreciation for departing board member Frank Ober who served for 9 years and Tony Marple who served for 6

School volunteer Pam Kenoyer, she's no stranger to kids

On a rainy March day last week, I sat down with Pam Kenoyer in her cozy, reconstructed 300 year old home on the Hilton Road. There was a warm fire burning in the fireplace as we reminisced about old times and her volunteer activities. After graduating from the University of Maine, Pam and her husband Ron moved to Whitefield in 1969 where Pam taught English at Lincoln Academy and then at Cony High School. She took a break from teaching to raise their four children, Kristen, Lynn, Sarah and Kate, who all attended the Whitefield School, where both Pam and Ron volunteered hundreds of hours of their time. In 1980 Pam co-founded The Whitefield Country School, a preschool run from her home on the Hilton Road. That school is still operating today and run by Joan Kierstead.

After returning to school to secure her Master's Degree in counseling from the University of Southern Maine, Pam worked for

Erskine Academy as a guidance counselor. She was also employed as a guidance counselor at Lincoln Academy before she eventually went to the Tech Center in Augusta as a guidance counselor and later as director. She remained at the Tech Center until her retirement.

As part of the work of the collaborative committee, (a group formed in response to issues that were brought forth by a group of Whitefield School parents), a volunteer effort was launched at the school. Pam agreed to become a volunteer citing her deep commitment and concern for the children and the school. She volunteers her time twice a week for middle school teacher Karen McCormick where she tutors children in whatever areas are need-

ed. When I asked Pam about her experience at the school she said, without pause, "Anyone who enjoys working with the youth will enjoy volunteering at the *Continued on page 2*

town budget. The overall budget proposal represents an increase of 13.1%, but after the use of the 2019 road carryover of \$110,000 and

the use of restricted funds, the net increase is from \$1,209,632 to \$1,246,068, or 3.1%. The roads budget of \$432,381 represents the amount needed to meet the needs of the 7th year of the Road Committee 10 year plan. In addition, there are two



\$50,000 capital budget amounts to set aside funds for the repair and or replacement of two major culverts.

Also discussed was the impact of the rising State valuation of Whitefield property, which is resulting in a reduced school subsidy and a higher percentage of the Lincoln County tax. The trend may signal the need for a town-wide reassessment in the next couple of years.

He also discussed proposed legislation submitted by Rep. David McCrea of Fort Fairfield to improve horse and buggy safety. This helped lead Whitefield's Amish community to develop their own alternative plan to which they are now committed. The plan includes two extended oil lanterns on both sides of the buggies and additional reflective tape. Given recent modifications to McCrea's bill, if it passes, Whitefield horse and buggies will be in compliance.

There was a long discussion about the Food Sovereignty ordinance with opponents discussing the need for food safety and the cost to those who comply with regulations and proponents of sovereignty stating that the ordinance would provide more opportunities for local farmers and some legal protection for the Amish community. The ordinance was approved.

Steve Smith initiated a discussion about adding funds to provide a secretary for the Planning Board. After several comments and suggestions, voters approved \$1,000 for that purpose.

The town also approved a 7.7% increase in budgeted non-property tax revenue such as excise taxes and revenue sharing to a total of \$652,419. The town also approved taking \$100,000 from surplus, a reduction of \$50,000 from 2019. Tony Marple noted that the Governor has proposed an increase in State revenue sharing to reduce property taxes, but the outcome is unknown.

Other than the additional Planning Board funding and the approval of all requested charity funding of \$7,839 compared to the \$5,617 recommended by the Budget Committee and \$7,019 by the board, there were no changes made to the Town Budget.

Whitefield Elementary School, the Town of Whitefield and the Midcoast Conservancy are in the process of embarking on an exciting new venture with the creation of a new trail here at Whitefield School as well as on townowned land. The funds for this project came from money granted to the town of Whitefield by the Atlantic Salmon Foundation after the completion of the Cooper's Mills dam removal process. While the project is just beginning, the initial vision is a trail that could be accessed either at the school or from town prop-

Get Outdoors on the Whitefield Trails!

Mud season is here, and a fun way to enjoy it is to go out and get some dirt on your shoes on our three trails in town. Happy Farm River Trail, the Marr's Ridge Trail, and the Sheepscot West Branch Trail all cross portions of conservation easements held by Midcoast Con-

servancy. They have been a strong partner to the Whitefield Trails Committee, helping with GPS mapping, an online presence for the trails (www.midcoastconservancy.org/preserve/sheepscot-valley), and promotion of joint work parties. Many thanks to landowners Eli, Anna and Christena Troyer, Sandy Benne and Ellis Percy for their cooperation.

Later this spring work will begin on a new trail on the Maguire Preserve, owned by Midcoast Conservancy. The property stretches from the Heath Road east to Weary Pond. At this point, a short loop has been flagged part way to the pond, ready for willing workers with loppers and blaze blue paint to make it a reality. Further development of this area will include a trail-head parking lot on Heath Road and some bog bridging extending into wet areas leading to the pond. These projects are possible because of a generous grant from the Atlantic Salmon Federation secured by the Select Board in conjunction with their Coopers Mills dam removal project. The money is for the town to use on trails in Whitefield that are within the Sheepscot River watershed

How to get there and why to go:

Happy Farm River Trail starts right behind the recycling center off Townhouse Road. Enjoy a full mile of river frontage and enjoy spring flowers and birds.

Marr's Ridge Trail starts on the middle section of Hunt's Meadow Road. Walk the half mile up to the ledge with granite sculptures or go further along on a loop through mixed hardwoods and old hemlock stands.

Sheepscot West Branch Trail starts from the Salmon Preserve parking lot on North Howe Road. Look for rocky ledges and deep pools along the undeveloped river, and see evidence of beaver and other critters.
