
# We own our Library & Community Center!

The Whitefield Library and Community Center is thrilled to announce the final signing on the purchase of the Arlington Grange Hall, and we are extremely appreciative to all donors and volunteers who made this purchase possible.

Work on summer programming for the Library is well underway with Story Hour/Activity Time for children, Game Night for youth and adults, Book Club, and a Knitters & Kneedles gathering being offered. Our open hours have doubled with the help of our generous volun-

teers. The hours are: Saturday 10-2 and Wednesday 10-12 and Wednesday now includes evenings 5-7pm.

## July 4<sup>th</sup> in Kings Mills - Whitefield's largest annual event!

The Kings Mills Fire Department was founded in the late 1940's when it became clear there was a growing need of fire service in Whitefield. Kings Mills took on hosting a community day

fundraiser each year on July 4<sup>th</sup> to bring the town together and to help raise money to help offset the cost of fire services. The historic event has always had a parade, field games, the fireman's auction, and concessions; as well as other events that came and went over the decades.

Times have changed, but the needs have not. Kings Mills has gone from being a fire department to a satellite station for the current Municipal Whitefield Fire Department leasing our building to the town for fire service. The cost of a single firefighter, after recruitment, purchase of turnout gear, training and equipping them with a SCBA certified air pact, along with ongo-


ing trainings and radios is approximately \$13,000 per firefighter. The Town of White-field has about 15 active firefighters totaling \$195,000 in total manpower costs. The issue

becomes far bigger once the cost of trucks and fuel and all of the additional equipment required for performing firefighting duties safely and properly is factored in. The ongoing goal at the KMVFD is to keep the July 4<sup>th</sup> Community Day Fundraiser alive and running well into the future to help defray some of

these costs and continue helping Whitefield Fire and Rescue.

As you may already know, the parade has been handed over to the town of Whitefield for insurance reasons. However, as mentioned in last month's newsletter, unlike the confusion caused last year, this year's parade will return to its roots with no insurance or registration requirements.


A combination Wine Tasting and Map Kick-off will take place at Sheepscot General Store on Friday night, June 24th. Join us for some wine, snacks and a

The idea to develop a map and guide originated at Sheepscot General Store when visitors to the store would say how much they liked the store, but wondered what other things Whitefield might have to offer.



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## Artist Kevin Misner to unveil parade painting at Kings Mills July 4th celebration

When I visited with Kevin Misner in his Pittston studio, it was like stepping into a Norman Rockwell vignette. Not only has Kevin's technique been inspired by the great artist, but Kevin himself seems to live

and breathe the aura of those times.

Last Fall, Kevin was inspired by photos he shot at our Fourth of July celebration. He combined and arranged the images digitally, putting pencil to paper and drawing to canvas, and has produced and captured our community at its best; enjoying a

beautiful day at the Fourth of July parade.

The oil painting, entitled *Anticipation*, will be unveiled at the Fourth of July celebration. Kevin has also generously donated the original pencil rendering of the painting which will be offered at the silent auction. The artwork has such fine definition you will recognize many of your friends.

Kevin describes himself as a self-taught artist who began drawing as a kid and just never stopped. About 12 years ago, he decided to paint full time. His medium is oil, and his technique is old school masters. His use of light gives life and warmth to his work making you feel like you are inside the canvas. He told me he loves getting up every morning and going to his converted chicken barn studio overlooking the Eastern River. Kevin smiles as he says he even dreams about future paintings. Kevin's work is on display at the Bayview Gallery in Brunswick, Scott Bundy Gallery in Kennebunk and Ironbound Gallery in Camden. If a picture speaks a thousand words, Kevin Misner's work takes you home to a time and place we remember with a feeling of warmth and light.

### At the Hair Works with April Capper

Her love of family and community is part of what defines April Capper, owner of The Hair Works on Grand Army Road. You can see it as she interacts with her family, her clients, and her community.

April was raised in Cahokia, Illinois, which is just east of St. Louis, Missouri. She went to school at Granite City School of Beauty Culture. She moved to Maine in 1987 and fell in love with the state. In 1989 she moved to Jefferson from Bath with her former husband and was working in Augusta at Barden's Beauty Shop. After her first son was born in 1993, she decided she wanted to work closer to home and community and started working at The Hair Works for Darlene Chase. dent hairstylist. She's always enjoyed working with the elderly and would volunteer at local nursing homes as a teenager.

April purchased the Hair Works from Darlene in February 1994, and later bought the building in October 1995 when her parents, sister (and family) and grandmother informed her they would be joining her in Maine. April shared how fortunate she feels that her family wanted to move closer to her and her son. That's what prompted her to purchase the building from the Maldovans. She knew her family needed a place to stay and her little home on Clary Lake was not going to house everyone.

April said, "Over the years this building on the corner of Grand Army and Vigue Road has been a blessing to me. I have been able to run my business, provide a home for my entire family, as well as a home for myself and my boys. At one time I was working fulltime, raising my sons, homeschooling my youngest and taking care of my disabled mother. It was possible to do all of that because it was all being done under the same roof. The support from this community has been amazing. I am in love with Whitefield and its residents. It has been an awesome place to live and work."

When asked what interests and experiences inspired her to enter the field and own her own business, April shared that her mother was placed in a halo brace after surviving a broken neck. April was only 11 years old, and she remembers her Dad trying to shampoo and cut her Mom's hair while she was in the halo brace. She said, "It was awful! He was such a wonderful husband and father, but lousy at cutting and shampooing hair. So, I started to shampoo Mom's hair and decided to try cutting it as well. I knew I couldn't make it look any worse than Daddy had done, and it turns out, it looked pretty good." April said that it was actually her Mom who encouraged her to go to cosmetology school.

The Hair Works is a full-service hair salon. April has tried to add several services over the years, but hair is what she knows and loves, and she's good at it. The Hair Works has a flexible schedule, open Tuesday through Saturday, by appointment, and she has evenings and Saturday morning appointments for those who work during the day.

Unfortunately, one of the challenges of working alone is she's unable to take walk-in clients at the moment. When asked what her biggest concern was running her own business, April said, "Staying on top of my game. This is a constantly changing, fast paced business. I am always searching for more education so I can keep learning and growing as a professional hairstylist – keeping it fresh, creative and fun for my clients and myself." April said she doesn't plan to go anywhere, and you will be able to find her right behind her chair at The Hair Works, looking out of her window at Gary Vogue's Christmas trees. She absolutely wants to grow as a person and as a hairstylist, and Whitefield is where she belongs.

April's advice is "Do what makes your heart sing. Every day I wake up grateful for my family, my friends, and this community of people. I surround myself with love, fun and laughter. I thoroughly enjoy people. I have the opportunity to make people look and feel great, and that always makes my heart sing. The friendships I have made here are by far my greatest reward. They come to me first as clients, but leave as my friend. Life could never get any better than that."
