Out and About In Whitefield

I had the pleasure of spending time on a recent Saturday with Benjamin Zook at his business, Cooper Canvas, located at 544 Cooper Road.

Benjamin moved to Whitefield from Michigan in August of last year, along with his wife, Annie, and their eight children. I met four of those children that day, including Fred, who was enormously helpful, especially after I discovered when I got to my car that I had left my keys in the canvas shop and he ran and got them for me. I also met the delightful Elizabeth and Isaac, who were pulling the equally charming Jonathan around in a garden cart, playing horseand-buggy.

I met Annie as well. She greeted me with a warm smile and a pleasingly firm handshake (I do like a good handshake — not too soft, not too hard). Annie's bake stand, filled with yummy goodies, sits in front of the Zook house, next door to the canvas business.

One might guess that the Zooks are an Amish family, especially with the horse-and-buggy reference, and one would be correct in guessing that. I was introduced to them by Whitefield resident David Chase.

Cooper Canvas, which officially opened at its present site June 1, specializes in making custom tarps, boat covers, and UTV enclosures, and in doing canvas repairs. Benjamin learned the trade from his father, who still resides in Michigan.

Doing custom, one-of-a-kind boat covers, such as the colorful pontoon boat covers Benjamin is often called upon to make, requires a certain kind of meticulousness and attention to detail. "It's something that not everyone can do," he said. "Not a lot of people will do this stuff. It requires a skill that not everybody has. My dad started (in the canvas trade) back in the '90s. My mom did upholstery – furniture and vinyl upholstery."

Benjamin said he is getting into upholstery as well. "I've taken on two jobs already – vinyl upholstery for two jobs in Waterville," he told me, adding that he has "a couple of people that want an-

tique car seats done."

Benjamin also recently made a grill cover and a hose cover for a fire truck. As for the UTV enclosures, Benjamin makes them with windows in the front, back, and sides, plus a zipper, for allweather driving. He said he sold a number of them to Family Farm & Home in Michigan, similar to Tractor Supply Co.

As for his boat-cover work, Benjamin said he likes "to stick to inland boats under 30 feet. But a lot of times, as long as they bring the boat out and it can fit in my shop, I can work on it. My shop is 40 feet long." He said he once

"did a 35-foot Sea Ray in Michigan – a fly-bridge bimini and drop curtains in clear all the way around."

Benjamin encourages people to come down to his shop to talk with him. (Check out his industrial sewing machines – one is three feet across – and the various colors of heavy canvas he offers.) Cooper Canvas is open Monday through Saturday and closed on Sundays.

"My first customer (at Cooper Canvas) was for a pontoon cover," Benjamin said. "That's what I'd say I specialize in – pontoon covers, and open-bow and cockpit covers."

When asked if he is a boater, the very likeable Benjamin smiled and said, ""Yeah, I like to go out on a boat and go fishin'."

Select Board Corner

This is the first article that will regularly appear in the Whitefield Newsletter to summarize likely issues of interest to the residents of Whitefield from

• Whitefield received a grant for \$75,000 from Maine DEP to replace the culvert on the Senott Road that crosses the Sheepscot River. The Roads Committee and Select Board member Keith Sanborn submitted the grant.

• On September 24 at 6:00 there will be a public meeting of the Select Board, Planning Board, Economic Development Committee, and Matt Lutkus from Damariscotta to discuss White-field's decision-making process regarding cultivation, manufacturing, testing, and retail sales of marijuana in Town. Damariscotta has already begun this process so Whitefield will have an opportunity to learn from their experience.

• Tina Laskey, who works in the Town Office as Deputy Administrator/Deputy Treasurer, has been now authorized to take on the role of Town Tax Collector. Congratulations Tina! The mil rate in Whitefield increased from 15.01 in 2019 to 15.69 in 2020 for several reasons. The Town taxation valuation of property decreased \$924,635 for 2020 which means less revenue will be coming to the Town through property taxes. The taxation valuation is determined by the state by averaging the past three years of property values. At the same time, the county, school, and municipal budgets increased \$150,600. Together these changes required the Select Board to increase the mil rate to balance the Town budget for 2020.

Clarissa Howard told us, "Our library is now called a Learning Commons which includes the library room and MakerSpace Room - this new concept is to promote more learning opportunities for students."

The Whitefield School staff is currently working towards a Vision that includes: "-The Learning Commons is where lifelong learning is nurtured - a supportive place to ponder, create, search, and formulate ideas. Students are encouraged to engage in problem exploration by asking questions, making mistakes, and collaborating with peers in their creations. Staff are also participating in the MakerSpace to model as well as collaborate with students and celebrate new ideas and projects."

In the new Learning Commons, the MakerSpace area that has been carved out is becoming a place where students can gather to create, invent, tinker, and discover by using a variety of tools and materials. Given the opportunity to explore, children will use their imaginations. These young "maker" minds have the capacity to become artists, engineers, knitters, painters, inventors, bakers, crafters, graphic designers, woodworkers, seamstresses, builders, programmers, and so much more! One never knows where a table of masking tape, cardboard, Legos, straws, and toothpicks might lead a young child! It will be interesting to follow someday!

Ms. Howard commented, "We are very excited about this new space and we are asking for donations of materials that people might have around their house they no longer need - for example: paper and toilet paper rolls, q-tips, popsicle sticks, cotton balls, material, Legos, straws, string, duct tape, masking tape, craft items - anything someone might think a child can look at and wonder what they could create." Working with what is already in their MakerSpace, it is obvious that these students are loving it! We are proud of Whitefield School's staff for embracing this project, and we're looking forward to hearing more from the students about their thoughts on this new learning space and their opportunity to

create throughout their school year. We congratulate everyone's efforts to make this school year exciting!
