Whitefield Elementary School Food / Clothing Pantry and the Christmas Giving Tree

Supporting students in their growth (physical, social, emotional and intellectual) is a prime goal at Whitefield Ele-mentary School (WHES). While many of the aspects of the school's support would be 💦 obvious, other areas of support that hold genuine significance may be more subtle. An example of this has been the expan-💦 sion of our Food / Clothing

Pantry. Many of our families experience food insecurity, and the supplemental food we offer families, often once or twice each week, helps to alleviate many of the fears and distress some of our families experience. During the summer we are part of a collective that offers five-six weeks of free breakfasts and lunches to WHES students and young adults. There is a tremendous need and we are part of a network of providers who attempt to meet the need. Over the past couple of years we have also expanded our Clothing Pantry to meet the needs of our students with supplemental clothing. As we head into the holiday season we also have created a "Giving



Tree" program by which staff and individuals from outside of the school can come into school and select an ornament from our tree. On that ornament will be the age, gender, size and likes/desires of an individual student here at school whose family has a definitive need. Those who pick up an ornament then make choices of Christmas gifts to try to help provide the child with a joyful holiday. These

gifts are provided anonymously and we can attest to the fact that it really does help to make for a wonderful holiday experience.

"This is not a fundraiser," said Judy, "but a time for the community to spend time with their neighbors and for children to make some crafts and visit with Santa."

When asked what her favorite thing about the Kings Mills Union Hall Christmas Party and Tree Lighting is, Judy simply said, "The children and Santa."

NEED A RIDE? Lincoln County F.I.S.H. can help

In case there is any doubt, living and aging in a rural community has its drawbacks. Sure, we love Whitefield, but being able to continue to live in the country is totally dependent on our ability to drive. Not even counting all those other

chores that must be done before winter, during winter, after winter and in-between. It's no picnic when you're closing in on 70, 80 or 90. The inability to drive is one of the biggest factors in forcing aging or disabled people to a more urban environment where they often find themselves having to make some hard choices.

At its last meeting, the newly formed Whitefield Cares group invited several providers to speak about the services they offer. One of

those providers was Edie Vaughan from Bristol, co-founder of L.C. F.I.S.H. – (Lincoln County Friends in Service Helping). I recently sat down with Edie to talk about the program and what they offer. She told me that four years ago while volunteering for another organization (Edie is the ultimate volunteer), Miles Hospital referred several residents to her who needed rides to medical appointments. Edie got busy and solicited the help of several members of her church and L.C.F.I.S.H. was born. After establishing protocols and guidelines, the first ride was provided four years ago, and they've been growing ever since. She explained L.C. F.I.S.H. is a mission of St. Andrews Episcopal Church in Newcastle which serve as an umbrella and provide secondary insurance for the volunteer drivers. I learned F.I.S.H. is an organization with providers in several states across the country. L.C.F.I.S.H. provides residents of Lincoln County who are in need of transportation with rides to medical appointments, errands, grocery shopping, and more.

There are currently 38 volunteer drivers. The rides are free and totally dependent upon the availability of a volunteer driver. Volunteers must undergo a criminal background check and have a list of guidelines they must follow. She said some volunteers drive several times each week, while others may drive less frequently.

Edie told me residents requesting rides come from all age groups, but the average age of riders is between 70 and 80. Riders must reside in Lincoln County and be unable to drive either permanently or temporarily, but have no other means of transportation. Edie explained that riders must be mobile and able to get in and out of the car with minimal assistance. Children under 18 must be accompanied by an adult or those who require a caregiver must be accompanied by the caregiver. Residents requesting rides should be realistic of the time required for the length of any appointments or errands. They request 48 hours advance notice to schedule most rides.

To request a ride the resident calls L.C.F.I.S.H. at 350-9808. The phone is answered by one of four volunteers who obtain pertinent information from the resident. During the intake process resident callers are asked questions, and if there are any health or safety concerns, a request may be denied. All accepted requests are logged into their computer and sent out via email to all drivers. Once a driver responds that they can fulfill the request, they are given the resident's information and details are worked out between the driver and the resident. All information is confidential.

Edie said during the month of October, they received 240 requests from 47 individual callers and provided 167 rides. Drivers drove over 4000 miles during the month. She told me there was one rider from Whitefield, and there is currently one volunteer driver from Whitefield. The service is free, but donations are welcome. She told me they have not had to fundraise as of yet, but have received most of their donations from the riders themselves. She commented that drivers can be reimbursed from L.C.F.I.S.H. funds.

F.I.S.H Continued from Pg. 2 She responded, "If you like people, you'll like doing this. A lot of it is very intimate.....sometimes you are with an individual for a very long ride.....you learn a lot and people like to tell their stories." When I asked her what motivates her to continue with this important commitment, she said simply, "It fills my soul".

Below are issues likely of interest to the residents of Whitefield in regards to the Select Board meetings of the previous month. - The Select Board hired local Whitefield resident Nicole Sciascia for the Office Assistant in the Town Office. Nicole started working full-time on November 18. Welcome Nicole!
- A Toys for Tots box was dropped off at the Town Office by the Marine Corps Reserve Coordinator for Lincoln County. Please consider donating a wrapped present for needy children.
- Town Office is collecting resident email addresses so that notices of Town events can be automatically sent to your inbox. If interested, please sign up at the Office counter.
- Carole Cifrino made a presentation at the November 12 meeting to inform the Select Board of an opportunity to support and improve recycling in Town and to create a new revenue stream based on the amount of materials recycled by Whitefield residents. In the past legislative session, a resolve was passed for DEP to create a new law for handling packaging materials that will provide an income source for municipalities. The Natural Resources Council of Maine drafted a resolution of support for the bill which the Select Board unanimously supported.

The Select Board began the process of drafting the Town Budget for 2020-2021.
