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Tis The Season

Since hunting season is upon us, we thought you might like to know what's happening in our woods from late October to the end of December.

November 1st ends archery season, but before we reach that date, on Saturday, October 26, Youth Gun Hunters may hunt deer with firearms if under supervision of a qualified adult. "Qualified" means a parent or guardian who has or has held a Maine hunting license or taken a hunter

safety course. A person 18 or older may be given permission to supervise a hunter 15 or under if he or she is approved by the parent or guardian and holds or has held a Maine hunting

license or has taken a Maine Hunter Safety

class. Mark your calendar; it is easy to forget. I did when bowhunting on the first Youth Day gun hunt.

Youth hunters between 10 and 15 years old need to be under effective control of an adult supervisor. I have always assumed this has meant visual and voice, and if under the age of ten, they must be within 20 feet at all times. Landowners and archers should be aware that firearm hunters may be in their woods on Youth Day. Also, to finish out the season, archers should consider carrying one piece of approved orange clothing.

ure Unless specified by posted signs or other approved means, hunters are not required to get approval to be on your land. Verbal approval or refusal to allow use of one's land is valid. IF&W Landown-

Out and About in Whitefield

I recently sat down with Taryn Marcus, who is the co-owner of Sheepscot General along with her husband, Ben Marcus, to catch up on their first foray into the world of industrial hemp production. Readers will recall that Sheepscot General recently held a pick-your-own-hemp event at its 3-acre hemp field, which, according to the Portland Press Herald, is "believed to be only the second publicly accessible hemp field in the U.S."

The turnout for the "u-pick" event was considerably less than expected, Taryn said, adding that "mostly, the u-pick was veterans and seniors. There were a few millennials mixed in there."

She cites cultural misconceptions as one possible reason for the dearth of pickers. Some people, she noted, might be unclear as to what industrial hemp, or cannabis, is exactly, and whether it is the same as or similar to the type of cannabis people smoke to significantly alter their consciousness.

The answer, said Taryn, is that, according to the federal definition of industrial hemp, it must contain .3% or less of tetrahydrocannabinol, commonly called THC, the main psychoactive component of cannabis. And Sheepscot General's hemp contains, according to recent testing, .03% THC, she said.

"It looks and smells just like the high-THC stuff, and I see why that's an issue," Taryn said. "We are growing a strain that is extremely low in THC. ... If you tried to get high, you couldn't."

The hemp grown at Sheepscot General is the type that ends up, after a string of processes, going into CBD – cannabidiol – products used

for such things as relieving anxiety in animals. "Usually that's where they start (with using CBD) – if they have animals that have anxiety," said Taryn, citing the example of pets that get anxious over the loud noises from

She also noted that the U.S. Food and Drug Administration "has legalized for (the treatment of) epilepsy a CBD isolate." Most of the industrial hemp grown anywhere is sent to an extracting lab "where the CBD component will be taken out of the plant and be used to make every CBD product at every gas station from here to California," said Taryn. The only difference with a lot of the CBD products – such as tinctures, edibles, and oral sprays -- sold at

gas stations is that the CBD comes from China, she said, "and there are a lot of issues with contamination in China. It's important to know where your medicine comes from." Sheepscot General's hemp is grown organically.

Speaking of medicine, a recent series of tincture-making classes (one uses the hemp buds to make CBD tinctures) at Sheepscot General were so wildly popular that the venue continues to add classes. See sheepscotgeneral.com or call 549-5185 for more details.

"I think the thing that people can do to help is to educate the public," Taryn said, adding, "I think the future of cannabis for our kids is it's going to be like alcohol. ... I think it will be normalized."

Sheepscot General is located at 98 Townhouse Road in White-field.

Augusta, Maine. Both hunters and landowners may pick some up at no charge.

Tree stands or metal objects may not be installed in trees without permission. Hunters are required to label their stands, and others are not allowed to use another person's stand without permission.

Archery ends November 1st. Deer Firearm Season is from November 2nd - November 30th; a half hour before sunrise to a half hour after sunset. Muzzleloading season runs from December 2 thru the 14th. Coyote night hunting begins December 16th and runs through the end of August. A special permit is required.

Wearing orange when in the

woods during November and December may not be required for non hunters, but it should be used; either a hat or a vest works. No species may be hunted on Sunday. Therefore, hunter orange isn't necessary, but many choose to wear at least one piece when out in the pucker-brush.

Any person in the woods with a firearm on Sunday is considered to be hunting and may be fined. There are a few exceptions; like target practicing or beaver trapping. No game may be hunted.

Religious opposition exemption: "A person may substitute articles of bright red clothing for the articles of hunter orange clothing... if the person has a religious opposition to the wearing of hunter orange clothing." Sec. 1. 12 MRSA §11203, sub-§1-A

According to Inland Fisheries & Wildlife records for 2018, there were 441 Whitefield residents who hunted with just firearms, 7 people who hunted with just archery equipment, and 38 who hunted with both. Increasingly, (just for interest sake), there are more females in Whitefield harvesting deer, bear and moose than at any other time. On a final note, we want everyone to be aware that the hunting season is here once again, and we want everyone to be safe.

Select Board Corner

September 15 – October 15, 2019

Below are issues of likely interest to the residents of Whitefield from the Select Board meetings of the previous month. For a complete description of the issues before the Board each meeting, please go to the Town website and read the Select Board minutes.

The Cemetery Committee has been working with volunteers to maintain or improve grave sites and the cemetery grounds at Coopers Mills Cemetery and the Woodman's Cemetery.

The Roads Committee has been very actively working to improve safety of Town roads, particularly on Hilton Road (installing a mirror to improve visibility at a dangerous hill top), the corner of Townhouse Rd and Kings Mills (working with DOT to see if a stop sign can be added to improve safety of cars turning onto Town House in front of the church), and seeking to install flashing lights on the school signs on Rt 126 to slow traffic during school hours.

13 Welcome to Whitefield (We Share the Roads) signs will be installed on main roads leading into Town.

A Maine DOT representative came to a Select Board meeting to review the process needed to replace a double culvert on Rt 194. The culvert will be replaced with a large single culvert that is more wildlife-friendly. This project will be completed quickly in 2021 with the road closed for two weeks and traffic rerouted.

The Select Board is discussing whether to hire a maintenance worker for the fire stations and town buildings. The backlog of needed repairs and maintenance on all the buildings has been growing and it may be time to budget for a new position.
