At this time, Howard Tuttle, Superintendent of RSU 12 has stated the RSU will follow the recommendation from the Commissioner of Education to end classroom instruction and implement a continuity of learning plan for distance education until the end of the 2019-2020 school year unless conditions change.

During this time of uncertainty, we see many of our school community families struggling. Many of these families were struggling prior to the pandemic and even more need support now more than ever.

The staff at the Whitefield School are working hard to make sure families in the community worry a little less about food. While school was in session we were able to support food insecurities by providing breakfast, lunch, and snacks (when necessary) for students. We also provided Friday backpacks that were given to those who needed some extra food for the weekends.

During school closure, the Whitefield School has been working to replicate food service for families in the community. Starting on April 20th, we will be delivering food to these families twice each week on Tuesdays and Fridays. Food deliveries will remain at the same time and will be larger disbursements. Along with Tuesday and

Friday food deliveries, we have also continued to support families that were receiving Friday food bags, (backpack program) from the school's food pantry. These food bags will be delivered on Fridays only.

The Whitefield Food Pantry has also extended its hours to accommodate the community. Additionally, Whitefield Cares, a volunteer comittee, offers food pick up and drop off for those who do not have transportation.

Out and About in Whitefield

We may be on coronavirus "lockdown," but it does not mean we have to do without healthy good food. Sheepscot General, that hub of goodness at 98 Townhouse Road in Whitefield, is (thankfully) open during the current pandemic period, but it is selling everything it offers for "curbside" pickup only. That means one cannot currently go inside the business to purchase groceries or other needed items. but must rather order ahead of time for same-day or next-day pickup outside the store.



Here's the scoop: Orders placed before noon will be for sameday pickup; orders placed after noon will be for the following day. Someone from Sheepscot General will call customers when their order is ready for pickup. Go to the following link to view the many grocery items available, such as bread, bagels, cookies, produce, fermented foods, dairy products, frozen meat, and much more, and to order.

Cafe food orders must be called in the same day at 549-5185. The menu and order forms are on the website https://www.sheepscotgeneral.com/.

Special orders are also available, which are pre-orders for kitchen items (such as chicken salad, whole quiche) or bulk grocery items (such as dry beans, flour, and rice).

When I asked Sheepscot General co-owner Taryn Marcus how she, her husband, Ben, and their staff are holding up during this trying period and whether they got a Paycheck Protection Program loan to help their small business, Taryn said, "We are currently applying for emergency loans that are being offered. We lost our cafe sales but have seen an increase in grocery sales.

"Online orders are the best way for us to quickly fill your requests," said Taryn. "We are still taking phone orders and we check our email every hour.

"We have chosen a small group of staff to work with us during this time," she noted. "We are trying our best to mitigate risk, especially because I am pregnant and therefore considered high risk. We also have staff that we would love to bring back on, but they live with people that are high risk or are high risk themselves. There are eight of us total working right now including Ben and I."

No one needs to miss out on such deliciousness as Sheepscot General's awesome bread (their olive bread, for instance, is to die for!) and regionally famous pizza during this time period, either. As Taryn put it, "We would love to sell more of our bread, made fresh every day, and pizza -- orders are taken from noon-7 p.m. every day.

"We love Whitefield and are grateful for all the love and support we have already received!"

Sheepscot General is open for business Tuesday-Saturday from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m. and Sunday from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m.


How to build a chimney in Whitefield???



Select Board Corner

March 15, 2020 - April 15, 2020

Below are issues of likely interest to residents of Whitefield from the Select Board meetings of the previous month. This issue covers the beginning of the State closure per Janet Mills' order "Social Distancing Emergency Executive Order due to the Covid-19 Pandemic". The Select Board meeting on March 17 was the last time the Select Board met in person; meetings on March 18 and March 27 were conducted remotely. - The Town of Whitefield has a new health officer! Ben Caron of the Whitefield Fire Department agreed on March 17 to take on the health officer responsibilities until a permanent replacement is identified. Thank you Ben!
- Much of the business of the Select Board has been focused on the Town's response to the Covid-19 pandemic and ongoing issues that arise because of our new reality.
- The Town Office will be closed indefinitely, until the State makes decisions regarding public activities. Darlene Beaulieu and staff will be on-site intermittently to maintain finances and respond to voice mails.
- The Central Fire Station Meeting Room will be closed to the public indefinitely.
- The Whitefield Town Meeting and Election were postponed per State emergency legislation. Those serving in elected positions will continue in those roles for the foreseeable future. The Select Board will meet on May 26th to evaluate options for a future Town Meeting and Elections date.
- The Select Board will continue to sign and approve accounts payable and payroll warrants during this period. The Board will continue to meet remotely every two
- Property taxes are due April 30, 2020 and may be mailed or dropped off through the mail slot on the left-most door at Town Office. Darlene Beaulieu will mail a receipt to property owners after taxes are received.
- The decision was made to continue paying Town staff during this period. Expenditures for the Town will be carefully reviewed in light of expected shortfalls in State revenue because of the pandemic.
- The Recycling Center is closed. Indefinitely. The bins outside are open and are being emptied but the building will remain closed until the Town Office is opened. Please do not leave cans and bottles by the building because no one will remove them until the building is opened!
- The Economic Development Committee is working on a proposal for funding by ConnectME to improve internet distribution throughout Whitefield. The Select Board signed a letter in support of the proposal.
