Select Board Corner

The Select Board has been busy in the past month, keeping Whitefield moving forward while monitoring the economic fallout of the Covid-19 pandemic so we can plan accordingly for the upcoming budget. This summary will go into a little more detail on preparations we're making to keep the public and Town employees safe and our Town on a solid financial footing as we move forward to open up and regain some sense of normalcy in our community. Below are issues of likely interest to residents of Whitefield from the Select Board meetings of the previous month. The Select Board met remotely on Zoom on April 28 and May 12. • State elections have been rescheduled for July 14th. The Select Board is working on a plan for one-way flow of the public through the Fire Station allowing people to enter one door and exit from another, limiting the number of people inside and maintaining social distancing. We are looking for an Elections Warden; if you are interested please call Darlene Beaulieu at the Town Office at 549-5175. If you

- are interested in obtaining an Absentee Ballot, please call the Town Office.
- At the May 26 meeting the Select Board will be deciding when and how to hold Town Elections and Meeting safely, more on that decision in the next newsletter! And check the website for updates.
- Estimates on State revenue sharing to
 Maine towns are down from pre-Covid 19
 projections about 20-40%. The Select
 Board is paying close attention to declining
 Town revenues and will be re-writing the
 Town Warrant Articles (previously posted
 in the 2019 Town Report) both to reduce
 anticipated expenses and to streamline the
 number of articles.
- The Select Board has already decided to postpone planned road paving and culvert replacement (a major part of the Town annual budget) to only that absolutely needed. Work on the Leonard's Bridge will be limited to the cost of design work only this year, with intention to move forward with construction next year. This decision was made in consultation with the DOT to ensure public safety along with fiscal prudence.
- Projects moving forward this summer will include brush pick up and clearing on roadsides and roadside mowing. The Town salt and *Continued on Page 2*

Out and About in Whitefield

Whitefield's own ProKnee Corp., a widely known manufacturer of industrial knee pads, recently branched out into the production of personal protective equipment (PPE) in response to a need generated by the COVID-19 pandemic. As ProKnee owner Lee Richards put it in a recent press release, "After securing a large batch of Lexan polycarbonate sheets, I knew we had everything we needed to get started right away on a superior, reusable face shield."

I was able to catch up with Jordan W. Richards, ProKnee's busy marketing director, and we did a short Q&A:

Christine LaPado-Breglia: Who are you selling the face shields to in Lincoln County?

Jordan W. Richards: Generally, just to name a few, Newcastle Fire Department, Lincoln County Sheriff's Office, Jefferson Fire and Rescue, [the Maine Department of] Marine Resources, grocery stores across Lincoln County, hardware stores across Lincoln county; health care facilities across Lincoln County, and dentists, nail technicians, bookstores, and hair salons out of Boothbay.

CLB: Can "ordinary" people purchase the PPE from you? If so, how?







JWR: Yes, most certainly! We have special at-cost, factory-direct pricing for Maine residents, who can place an order through our online

form, www.proknee.com/face-shield-order-form, or by calling 1-800-549-5018. Pickup is available at our 137 Devine Road, Whitefield, location, but order pickup must be scheduled beforehand to ensure we have your order ready. Out-of-state residents can purchase through our Maine distributor, Independence Floor Supply, out of Westbrook, at www.ifsupply.com/covid-19-polycarbonate-face-shields/.

CLB: What has the response been to your PPE production, both in terms of sales and comments from the public?

JWR: Happy to report that the response has been extremely positive from across the state of Maine! From the vast amount of supportive comments, reactions, and shares to our initial and subsequent <u>Facebook posts</u>, to the evening news pieces by <u>WGME</u> and <u>News Center Maine</u>. Sales have been reflective of this, enough so that we came out with an additional longer, wider, deeper model, the <u>"Max Protection" model</u>, to accommodate the needs of dentists to fit their *Continued on Page 2*

ProKnee from Pg. 1 surgical loupes [magnification devices used to see small details closely] as they look to meet new government requirements to open back up.

CLB: How long will you continue to do this?

JWR: We plan to keep our reusable face shields as part of our permanent line as we designed them to meet our ProKnee standards of making durable, long-lasting products that are custom fitted to the user. We normally produce another type of PPE, custom-fit kneepads, so the shields actually complement what we normally manufacture quite wonderfully.

CLB: Anything else you would like to say?

JWR: Our future plans include adapting a version to suit the needs of the construction industry, our standard customer base.

The Office Staff thanks you in advance for keeping us safe!




Whitefield School food pantry continues to need support

Town Office and Recycling Center Open!

The Town Office re-opened on May 18 and the Recycling Center opened on May 23. The office is operating with a Covid-19 protocol. Only two members of the public will be allowed to enter at one time. When you come to the office you will see a sign indicating that you should STOP outside – and wait for the indication that you are welcome to enter the office. To the left of the door in the window you will see a red STOP sign which means two people are already inside; when the sign switches to green (or the staff waves you in) you may proceed inside. While you conduct your business at the counter, you will notice some very nice new plexiglass shields installed. Select Board member Keith Sanborn generously volunteered his time to cut and erect shields at both windows with a divider between them to protect the staff and the public from any unwanted sharing of germs or virus at any time of year. The counter will be disinfected between customers. And, as is becoming normal today, remember to always keep at least 6 feet apart from others and wear a mask in any part of your visit to the

The Recycling Center opened on May 23. The outside bins have remained open to the public even during the closure of the Center. The building is now open on Saturdays from 8:00-12:00 and will admit only one person at a time through the open garage door. The entrance to the building will be partially closed off with barrels to help Julianna Elder regulate the people entering and exiting the building. The Swap Shop will be closed for the foreseeable future because it is too difficult to ensure the safety of donated items while managing people using the recycling portion of the building.

Town staff gave a great deal of thought and consideration to these procedures and are eager to see Whitefield returning to normal. Please be patient during any delays in your visits and welcome back!
