Inside, you'll be warmly greeted by Rodney or Kay or their children, Mark and Margo. They grow over 50 varieties of apples. They also grow pears, plums, crabapples, pumpkins and gourds. Fresh and delicious cider is pressed without additives or preservatives at the orchard. I would also recommend picking up a piece (or two) of Kay's delectable peanut butter fudge. The apple orchard is open to pick your own apples which is a fun activity. Picking your own allows you to walk through the orchard, admire the trees and take in the beauty of this amazing orchard. The orchard is open for pick your own seven days a week 9:00 am-5:30 pm. If you prefer not to pick or time does not allow, you can always buy apples already picked in the barn.

Apples from the orchard are so crisp and delicious, wonderful for eating and even better for baking! Fall would not be complete without making Kay Bailey's

Famous Apple Squares. They are a favorite in my house! If you have never made these apple squares, do not hesitate, they are very easy. In a short time, you will have sweet apple cinnamon-y goodness sitting on your counter! Here is the recipe-

Baked Apple Squares

- 1 34 cups sugar
- 2 cups flour 1 tsp cinnamon
- 1 tsp vanilla
- 3 eggs 1 tsp baking powde 1/2 tsp salt

- % cup cooking oil 2 cups thinly sliced apples 1 cup chopped nuts (optional)

Beat eggs, add sugar gradually, and beat until mixture is light and fluffy. Add sifted dry ingredients. Add oil and vanilla. Fold in nuts, fold in the apple sices. Turn into

In 1885, Whitefield voted to establish a "Free High School" which provided for an additional two years beyond grammar school. Some years there were two, some years three schools, held simultaneously or alternately, at Kings Mills, North Whitefield (Grange Hall), Keyes Corner, Church District and Coopers Mills. In 1914 the state decreed that there should be a permanent location. From 1914 until 1943 the Whitefield High School was held only at Kings Mills. Students from the other parts of town often boarded during the week with Kings Mills families. The grammar school met downstairs and the high school met upstairs. Many students went on to finish high school at Gardiner or Cony High Schools after graduation from Whitefield High School.

Select Board Corner

August 15-September 15, 2021

Below are issues of likely interest to the residents of Whitefield from the Select Board meetings of the previous two months. - A group of about 20 residents in Town attended the August 31 Select Board meeting to discuss the closure of Weary Pond Road by Keith Radonis. Jake Matthews represented the residents to say that while the road was no longer a Town road, the right-of -way has been used for walking and recreation for many years and should remain open. Board Chair Lester Sheaffer requested that residents summarize their points-of-view in a letter to the Board. Keith Radonis submitted materials to the Board supporting his viewpoint at the September 14 meeting. Both sets of documents will be sent to the Town Attorney to review the legal matter and determine next steps.
- The Leonard's Bridge culvert repair moved forward significantly
 with acceptance of the lowest bid for construction by Dirigo Timberlands for \$165,000. A Special Town Meeting was held on September 9 at the Whitefield School where residents approved appropriation of \$35,000 from surplus for the remainder of the funding for the
 project. Replacement of the culvert will be done in October/
 November.
- Road Commissioner David Boynton has completed improvements on Hollywood Boulevard and has begun working on Doyle Road. These dirt roads are annually so muddy that travel becomes difficult to impossible. The roads are being reconstructed with a fabric underlay which should greatly improve drainage and hopefully eliminate the need and cost for gravel. This method is used very successfully in Vermont. The plan is to work on each of the gravel roads in Town that have passage problems in the Spring.

Town News

Well here we are in October (already), my favorite time of the year! It is tax bill season as well. You will be receiving them in the mail, if you haven't already. Please take notice of the insert in with the tax bill this year, it has a lot of helpful information on it (put it on your fridge). The first half is due November 30, 2021. Again, I ask for your assistance, if you look at all the information on your bill, especially to see if your name(s) and address are correct and current, also the book and page (should have a date after of it). If not, contact me to discuss any discrepancies you see. It is important to keep us updated with changes of addresses you may have to ensure tax bills and any other mailings reach you properly. Three ways to pay your tax bill 1. In person 2. Mail in 3. Pay online, go to our website: https://townofwhitefield.com/tax-information/ Keep in mind you will be charged 2.5% portal fee of the total being charged.

Dog Licenses – you may start licensing your dog(s) October 15th for the 2022 year. Bring current Rabies and Spay/Neut. Cert, especially if it is a new dog. If you are licensing a previous dog, you may call and see if we have current Rabies on file.

November 2nd State Referendum Election, Polls will be OPEN 8 am – 8 pm at Central Fire Station. If you prefer to vote early, there are three ways you can request and absentee ballot: stop by the town office to request in person, call the town office to request over the phone or use the online Absentee Ballot request service on the maine.gov website at https://apps.web.maine.gov/cgi-bin/online/AbsenteeBallot/index.pl

We encourage wearing a mask when entering the Town Office to ensure everybody's safety.

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
