Summer at Whitefield Elementary: Grants, Good Food, Gardening, Greenhouse and More

While the halls at Whitefield Elementary (WHES) are much quiet-

er in the summer, learning opportunities and activity abound.

Through a couple of grants secured by Mike Flynn, RSU #12 School Nutrition Director, the school is, once again, delivering breakfast and lunch, enough for five days of the week, to families across Whitefield. Coordinated by Vicki Dill, WHES Kitchen Manager, and supported by Sue Peaslee, WHES is delivering meals to almost 100 chil-



dren in town. This grant has extended the program supporting the delivery of food initiated during the height of the COVID-19 pandemic but ended in June.

EMS crisis – A problem for all of us

We've been talking about this for several years, but somehow no one really thought the day would come when there would be no EMS capacity at the Whitefield Fire Department. The reason: The one and only EMT at the department, is moving out of town and there is no one trained to pick up the position.

Who doesn't know about the staffing shortages in Maine and the entire country? Or the supply chain problems, the lack of young people to step in where so many have hit retirement age or come close and due to the pandemic, decided to call it quits earlier. Really, who needed the hassle?

On July18th about 25 people gathered at the fire station to talk about the crisis and what to do about it. According to fire chief Jesse Barton and EMS chief Ben Caron, as one would expect, there are more emergency calls every year and fewer fire fighters and EMS staff available. They told the crowd the staffing shortage hits everyone, including Delta Ambulance, the town's responding ambulance service. Caron said due to a serious shortage of staff at Delta the response time for Whitefield has increased.

What does this mean for us? It means with no EMS on board at the fire department and with increased wait times when an emergency is called in, the critical time between response and getting medical assistance will be increased. A lot can happen in 25 minutes or longer without medical intervention.

What's the answer? Several ideas were floated around the room, including a paid position, creative recruitment efforts and several others. Louis Sell suggested the Select Board take this problem on as a front and center task. Select person Charlene Donahue responded they will be working with the Department, and she suggested starting a volunteer auxiliary as a way to help with recruitment, retention and engagement. She asks anyone who is interested in helping to contact the town.

It really is, right now, all hands on deck.

The school Gardening Club program brings students into school weekly to help in gardening efforts. Organized by Garden Club advisors Karen McCormick and Tim Davis, students from all grade levels come in to work in both the current greenhouse, as well as the school's gardens. Performing all the standard gardening tasks, this provides these enthusiastic young gardeners the opportunity to learn new skills and, happily, get their hands dirty. Given that many of the vegetables harvested in the fall are utilized by our nutrition program, club members experience a real sense of satisfaction in their efforts to help feed the school. In mid-July, the club harvested Kohlrabi (a German turnip), cucumbers, zucchini, and summer squash, plus basil in the dehydrator. And they planted a new crop of beans and cucumbers.

Plans for the construction of a new greenhouse are coming together with a goal of it being fully operational by the time school opens for the 2022-2023 year.

July found the summer school programming in full swing with students participating in both Extended School Year (ESY) programs and Title 1 programming. These are four-week summer programs designed to maintain and enhance learners' skills with the chief goal being to prevent the "summer slide" that occurs for individuals when they do not have a focused academic schedule over the summer and their essential reading and mathematics skills decline.

According to Mark Deblois, WHES Principal, "schools in summer look like a disaster area as the custodial staff empties all rooms to provide a thorough cleaning to all classrooms and offices. This is also the time that classroom and hallway floors are stripped of the old wax and refinished...a very critical summer task." He continued, "our custodial staff have been working very hard and their progress is steady, even having to work around the various activities that are scheduled in the school during the summer. While it looks like a disaster now, it will all be pulled together nicely for the beginning of school."

Schools begins on August 31st.

You can still get your \$850 State rebate check

You can still get a rebate check for \$850 even if you haven't filed a State Income tax return yet. You have until October 31st to file. You must file a tax return in order to get the rebate. Tax forms can usually be obtained through the post office or you can print one from the online website – just type in Maine State tax forms. The form is only a couple of pages long and fairly simple to fill out. There is a guide that is posted alongside the online form that can answer any questions.

The Whitefield Planning Board has been developing a Commercial/Community Solar Energy Facility Ordinance to responsibly encourage sustainable solar energy, but to also protect the rural character of our town. We are encouraging the citizens of Whitefield to participate by attending the public hearing on our C/CSEF ordinance which is scheduled for Wednesday, August 3rd at 6:00 PM at the Whitefield Fire Station. It is your opportunity to review and comment on the proposed ordinance.

August 2022 - recent approval by Whitefield Planning Board Tiny Cabins of Maine, owned by Joel Pitcher and Sherri Simmons, received a permit from the Whitefield Planning Board to build up to eight tiny units on Rt. 17. The cabins will occupy probably 10 acres of the 88-acre property, and will offer short-term stays. The couple's signature goal is to provide a retreat where veterans can reunite.

Select Board Notes

Below are issues of likely interest to the residents of Whitefield from the Select Board meetings of the previous month. - The Select Board has been working on junkyard notices, supporting residents to clean them up and following up with residents who have not yet
- The recycling area parking lot has been paved along with North Howe Rd and Hilton Rd.
- A roadside brush clearing contract has been awarded
- The board had an extensive conversation about the future of emergency medical services and first responders in town, and held a follow up meeting to get more indepth. There will be more attention on this issue in the near future
- The board is following up on the broadband expansion work in town and researching possibility of cellular repeaters to extend coverage throughout town

Congratulations Dr. Hodgdon

Dr. Cameron T. Hodgdon, son of Tracy Northrup of Whitefield and Tyler Hodgdon of Boothbay, received his Doctorate of Philosophy in Marine Biology from the University of Maine on May 6^{th} .

After completing his dual degree in Marine Science and Ap-

plied Mathematics at the University of New England, Hodgdon started his PhD under the advisement of Dr. Yong Chen at the University of Maine in the fall of 2017. His dissertation work was focused on Maine's scallop and lobster fisheries: trying to predict how these stocks and industries will change in the future. This work led Hodgdon to 14 peer reviewed publications in international journals.

Hodgdon is a National Marine Fisheries Service and National Sea Grant



Population and Ecosystem Dynamics Fellow, an ICES Stock Assessment Review Group leader for European fish stocks, a member of the Lenfest Ocean Program's International Crustacean Task Force, a member of the Maine Department of Marine Resources Lobster Research Collaborative, and winner of the University of Maine's Three Minute Thesis Competition.

In New York, Hodgdon has already started a postdoctoral research position at Stonybrook University where he will continue his work with the lobster fishery as a member of the School of Marine and Atmospheric Sciences and the Institute for Advanced Computational Science.
