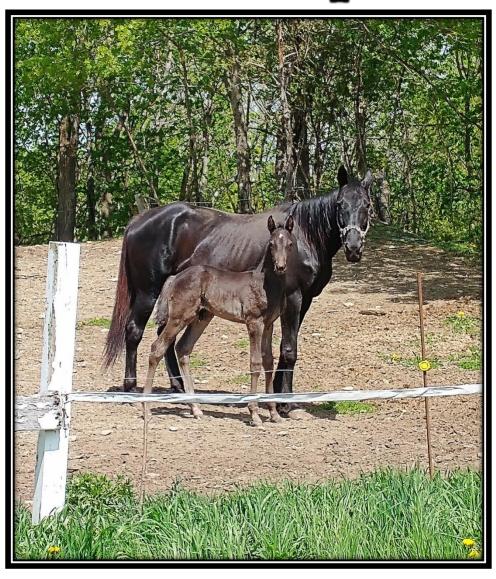

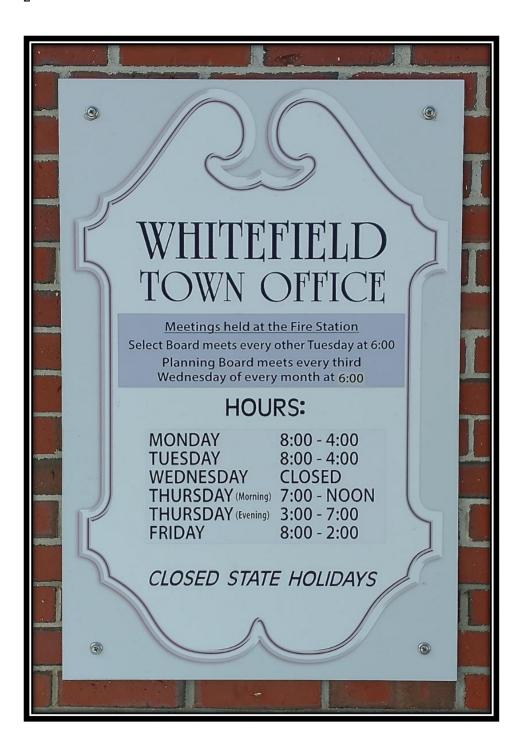


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Spirit of America Award 2024

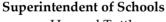

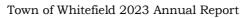

Select Board Report

The Select Board started the year with two new members: James Torbert and Joshua Leard. Delta ambulance service has started charging the town for its services and the Board signed our first contract with them.

The Joy's Pond culvert replacement was finally completed after budgeting money for two years. We were able to gain \$146,000 in grant money to go toward this project.

The sand shed received some damage from the May Day rain/windstorm and needed to be repaired along with replacing 10,000 screws in the roof. The older, smaller screws were working themselves loose and needed to be replaced before any damage to the roof could occur.

Our snowplow contract ended this year. We went out to bid and the best reply came from Spicer Tree Specialists who we hired for the next three years.

Another issue that came up was using the former nursing home, Country Manor, for a holistic sober center. We had numerous meetings around this topic. In the end we still haven't seen an application to build from the company.

We held a public hearing for two liquor licenses which were both approved: Sheepscot General and Sheepscot Links.

We had the public water source tested for PFAS and it came back with too high of a particle count. To fix this we installed a filter system designed for removal of PFAS and we test the water monthly.

If you haven't been to the Town Office to see the upgrade to the war memorial you should stop by and see the great job that was done as an Eagle Scout project.

Delta ambulance is moving out of Augusta and is looking for another place to locate. Coopers Mills Fire Department building seems an ideal location for them. The Town and Delta are in negotiations with Coopers Mills Volunteer Fire Department Association to try to bring an ambulance service closer to Whitefield.

And finally, this is Lester Sheaffer's last year on the Select Board. He has spent 12 years on the Board and another 8 years between the RSU and School Union 132. Thank you, Lester, for your years of service to the Town.

Administrative Assistant's Report

To the residents/taxpayers for the Town of Whitefield,

I want to say a big THANK YOU to ALL the Volunteers for Whitefield! There are several committees here in town, all of which are volunteer members. We are always looking for new volunteers, so if you have time and a desire to help out the community, stop by the town office to let us know. You can also read any of their reports within this annual report and reach out to any of the members listed in each committee or stop by one of the regularly scheduled meetings of the committee, they are always welcoming new members.

The Select Board named the Fire Station Meeting Room in Memory of our past Fire Chief, Scott Higgins, "The Scott Higgins Memorial Meeting Room". A sign has been displayed above the entrance to the meeting room.

Thomas Bowden, a member of Boy Scout Troop #609, approached the select board to upgrade the Veteran Memorial area at the Town Office as an Eagle Scout Community Service Project. The board approved after a few revisions to the original plan presented. Thomas then got to work along with a few other scouts from his troop, family members and friends. The project was completed in October 2023. If you haven't had a moment to see it, stop by and check it out. Congratulations on the completion of your community service project and earning the Eagle Scout rank.

Projects that have been completed around the town....

A Grader Storage Area on the back of the Sand & Salt Shed. The project was completed in February 2023. The work was done by Ford Enterprises Inc out of Hope, Maine.

The parking lot of the Sand & Salt Shed and the Recycling area were paved by All States Construction Inc, the same company that did the paving on North Howe Road and Hilton Road. (See photos of each on page 214)

The public water access which was PFAS positive, is now below the state guideline of 20 ng/L. The PFAS filtration system has been installed and the reported level is now <2.00 ng/L. The filtration system is working as it should and will be PFAS tested annually. Be mindful when using the public water access, that it is a well. If it is a dry season, try to use with some limits to make sure that it doesn't go dry. Around the office.....

A project that has been in the works for several years is preserving older record books, this is an ongoing project. Each year in the budget we budget for 2 books to be preserved, this past year was the oldest one, 1791 – 1906 Balltown Plantation Records, along with an Intentions of Marriage 1892 – 1949. These record books along with all the rest are available to view during regular business hours. (See photos on page 214)

Administrative Assistant's Report cont.

Entryway Roofs have been hand crafted by Erik Ekholm and with assistance from Kip Glidden. These will protect the customers from rain, snow and ice falling off the roof when entering the town office. (See photos on page 214)

We hired a new full time Office Clerk in May 2023, Cameron Maillet. Welcome! He has been a great addition to the office. If you haven't met him yet stop by and say Hello and introduce yourself. I want to say Thank You to all of the Office Staff for your commitment and dedication to the office. We all work well together and are a great Team! I couldn't do it without all of you.

Town Clerk Report

Let's talk a little about, Dog licensing.....As a dog owner, it is your responsibility to license your dog(s). All dogs 6 months and older must be licensed. It's a State Law, we don't make the laws, we just follow them. You have a 3 ½ month timeframe to get it done without a penalty. I will reiterate again this year: Licensing starts October 15th every year and you have until January 31st (3 ½ months). Late fee begins February 1st, no exceptions. Licensing your dog is not different than registering your vehicle, an ATV, a snowmobile or getting a hunting and/or fishing license. This is just another annual license that must be done and it costs the least amount to do, it's only \$6.00 for altered and \$11.00 for non-altered dogs. There are even multiple options (4 of them) for you to get the licensing done. 1. In person at the town office 2. Over the phone with a credit card (tags will be mailed to you) 3. Mail a check in to the office (tags will be mailed to you) and finally 4. Online with a credit card (a link is on the town website & tags will be mailed to you) Online service is only available Oct 15th – Jan 31st. We give friendly reminders in person, signage at our front counters, on the website and we also mail reminder cards out near the end of December. Keep in mind licenses expire December 31st each year, but you have a grace period till January 31st to get them done. As some of you know, last year, the ACO visited those that were not licensed within the required time. The Town of Whitefield contracts with the Lincoln County Sheriff's Office for the Animal Control Officer, Allen Oliver, who is an employee of the county and covers several municipalities (15) within Lincoln County for these services. Part of his job is to reach out to owners with unlicensed dogs and give them a reminder and the opportunity to get the dog(s) licensed. We are here doing our best to assist you in getting this task completed on time. We don't like to charge the extra \$25 after February 1st, we are required to by law.

Marriage Licenses.... For those who are thinking of getting a marriage license. The process is rather easy when you are prepared. For those that have not been married before, you each need to come in together with ID's and complete the required intentions form. These forms are also on our website that can be printed and filled out in advance of coming to the office, but DO NOT sign them before you arrive. The process in the office takes approximately 45 minutes, please allow adequate time. For those that have been married before you must bring a Certified copy of

your divorce decree. The remainder of the process is the same as above. The fee for the marriage license is \$40. If certificates are needed after, you must come in and request them at \$21 for the first copy and \$6 each additional at the time. We do not automatically mail marriage certificates to you. You must request and purchase them.

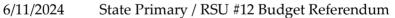

Assessing Information for Taxpayers

Information is available, on all properties in Whitefield, for inspection or review by taxpayers and the public during regular office hours or it is available on our website https://townofwhitefield.com/town-tax-maps/

If you have any questions regarding property assessments, contact the Town Office at 549-5175 to be put on the assessors' schedule for an appointment. RJD Appraisal, who act as our Assessors Agent, are scheduled to be in the office once a month. When in the office they update the regular annual reviews of new notice to builds or any other changes submitted, yearly transfers, meet with taxpayers, etc.

All notifications and applications for exemptions must be filed at the Town Office no later than April 1, 2024 for the 2025 tax year. In the case of property owned by individuals, there are possible exemptions for homestead, certain veterans and blind persons as described below.

Homestead - A person who owns his/her own home and has owned a home in Maine for at least 12 months on or before April 1, 2024 can apply for a Homestead Exemption. One can only receive this exemption on the home that is his/her primary residence. The State's current Homestead Exemption amount is \$25,000.

Veterans who will be 62 years of age on or before April 1, 2024 and who served during recognized war periods or any widow or minor children of veterans who would have been 62 years of age as of April 1, 2024 **may be** eligible for a tax exemption. **Veterans** receiving a 100% disability pension from the Veterans Administration **may be** eligible for an exemption. The State's current Veteran Exemption amount is \$6,000.

Any person who is declared blind by a Licensed Doctor should notify the Assessors on or before April 1, 2024 to see if he or she is eligible for a tax exemption. The State's current Blind Exemption amount is \$4,000.

If you are currently receiving any of these exemptions, still reside at the same residence, you **do not need to reapply** each year.

The State gathers sales information every year from each municipality and determines by a percentage how far our average sales are from market value. When we are more than 10% below, the state no longer reimburses our exemptions at the full rate. It is adjusted by a percentage, by how much we are below market value. We are currently at 76%. These are our current rates for each exemption - Homestead 19,000, Veterans 4,560, Blind 3,040. Tree Growth Soft wood 288, Mixed wood 354 and Hard wood 231. In 2022 we were at 92%. Due to the decrease, we are beginning the process for a full revaluation. This will bring our Exemption values back up to 100% for the 2025 taxes in September 2024.

Assessing Information for Taxpayers Cont.

The **town-wide revaluation** has now begun, by RJD Appraisal. This will consist of photos of each property, sketches of each building on each property, reviewing the sales data for the past 3 years, a visit to every property within the town with buildings on it, etc.. Once completed, a letter will be mailed to every landowner. A date will be set for anyone with questions to come to discuss the changes with the Assessor. If you have any questions before the completion of the revaluation, contact the Town Office during regular business hours. It is projected to be completed by the beginning of August 2024.

The **Property Tax Stabilization Program**, LD 290, (began in 2022, for 2023 taxes) has been REPEALED. This only applied to 2023 taxes. 189 taxpayers had been approved. See Real Estate Valuations with an STA next to the tax amount.

If you are planning on any type of construction project, adding on, new construction, outbuildings, etc. remember to complete a **Notice to Build** to be approved before construction begins. Both the Notice to Build and Building and Development Ordinance are available on our website at

Every homeowner in Maine, unless exempted by law, is obligated to pay property taxes on property owned as of April 1 of every year. Your property taxes fund local government services like law enforcement, fire department, and public schools.

Failure to receive a tax bill does not excuse you from paying taxes. If you have reasons to believe your home was wrongly valued, you can appeal property taxes by meeting with the assessor.

(Liens, 36 M.R.S. § 942, are filed at the registry for unpaid RE Taxes 8-12 months after commitment by the Tax Collector. The Tax Collector sends a 30 day notice to the taxpayers by certified mail, 30 days prior to the filing of the tax lien. Once the lien is filed is expires 18 months after the filing date of the lien, 36 M.R.S. § 943. The Treasurer sends a 45-30 day notice of impending foreclosure by certified mail prior to the foreclosure date. If after the 18 months there is a balance on that account the town automatically forecloses on the property. The Town of Whitefield has a schedule that is followed from year to year (subject to change). Tax commitment is normally in mid-September, liens are normally filed around mid-August the following year, 18 months from that lien filing date is the foreclosure date, which is usually mid-February. After foreclosure, the municipal officers become responsible, to the extent authorized by the municipal legislative body, for the disposition of any tax-acquired property.)

What to bring to register a vehicle:

Re-registration: Previous Registration, Insurance Card and Mileage.

New Registration (dealer sale): Bill of Sale, Blue Title Application Form, Window sticker (brand new only), Insurance Card and Mileage

New Registration (private sale): Bill of Sale, Title from previous owner (on all vehicles '95 and newer), Insurance Card and Mileage.

New Registration (transfer): Same as above, plus the registration of previous vehicle you had or are transferring from.

What to bring to register ATV, Boat or Snowmobile:

No titles for any of these types of vehicles.

Re-registration: Previous Registration.

New Registration (dealer sale): Bill of Sale from dealership.

<u>For New Boats:</u> Information needed is Horsepower, Boat Length, Boat Type, Hull, Fuel, Engine Drive Type and Propulsion Type.

New Registration (private sale): Bill of Sale signed by both seller and buyer. Prior registration # (Boat ME #) is very helpful.

Note: If boat has no hull #, there is a process to acquire one, contact town office or IF & W for more information.

All Bills of Sale MUST have:

<u>Name and Address</u> of <u>Seller</u> and <u>Buyer</u>, <u>Year</u>, <u>Make</u>, <u>Model</u>, <u>VIN #, Date of Sale</u> and must be <u>Signed by Both Parties</u>.

Treasurer's Report 2023

As I begin my 3rd year as Treasurer, I am proud to say the books are now in a manageable working order. The audit will be completed in a timelier manner than in the last two years.

The town is fortunate to have such great volunteers for the various committees, along with the Select Board, who help consider projects with substantial budgets to be raised by taxes over multiple years, so it doesn't impact taxes in all one year. Such projects include the Leonard's Bridge Culvert (4 years), Joy's Pond Culvert (2 years), Town Revaluation (2 years), Solar Panels (4 years), etc. The town is always looking for new volunteers, if you are interested in joining a committee contact me at the office.

The Town received \$5,000 from generous donors for the Heating Assistance Fund. THANK YOU to those that have already donated. We are continuing to accept donations throughout the year to help those that may be in need. Donations can be mailed to the town office. These funds assisted 7 Whitefield residents.

All 2021 RE Tax Liens recorded on August 16, 2021 foreclosed on February 16, 2023. Thirteen (13) accounts received the certified foreclosure notices, 12 of them paid in full and 1 being set up on a payment plan. The 2022 RE Tax Liens recorded on August 10, 2022 and will foreclose on February 10, 2024. The 2023 RE Tax Liens were filed on August 14, 2023 which means they will foreclose on February 14, 2025. Real Estate (RE) Tax Liens expire 18 months from the date of recording at the registry of deeds.

The balance of the American Rescue Plan Act "ARPA" funds from the federal government was \$134,250.28 as of 6.30.22. This past year the town approved \$95,300 of the balance for training building for Fire Dept, KMUHA ADA accessible bathroom, WHS track lighting and Whitefield Library ADA accessible walkway and parking lot. \$63,407.78 has been expended of that approved amount. This brings our total up to \$170,384.08 that has been expended of the \$241,083.80. A couple of the projects have yet to be completed. The balance of approximately \$35,750 will be put forth to the town at the annual town meeting in March 2024 for a couple items for the Town Office (equipment for live streaming meetings and online viewer for town parcel data), expansion of the Coopers Mills Fire Station KMUHA

ADA accessible bathroom and Whitefield Library for a standby generator. These 5 requests total more than the amount available. It will be left to you, as the legislative body at the town meeting, to vote on where you would like the funds used, the Select Board have given their recommendations. ARPA Funds must be approved by the end of 2024.

Report on the Audit of the Financial Statements

Opinions

We have audited the financial statements of the governmental activities, each major fund and the aggregate remaining fund information of the Town of Whitefield, Maine, as of and for the year ended June 30, 2023 and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the Town of Whitefield, Maine's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents.

In our opinion, the accompanying financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the respective financial position of the governmental activities, each major fund and the aggregate remaining fund information of the Town of Whitefield, Maine as of June 30, 2023 and the respective changes in financial position and, where applicable, cash flows thereof for the year then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Basis for Opinions

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America (GAAS) and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are required to be independent of the Town of Whitefield and to meet our other ethical responsibilities, in accordance with the relevant ethical requirements relating to our audit. Such information is the responsibility of management and was derived from and relates directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements. The information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements or to the basic financial statements themselves and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. The Town of Whitefield's basic financial statements include the following components: 1) government-wide financial statements, 2) fund financial statements and 3) notes to the financial statements. This report also includes required supplementary information which consists of the general fund budgetary comparison schedule, OPEB schedules and other supplementary information which includes combining and other schedules.

Basic Financial Statements

The basic financial statements include financial information in two differing views: the government-wide financial statements and the fund financial statements. These basic financial statements also include the notes to financial statements that explain in more detail certain information in the financial statements and also provide the user with the accounting policies used in the preparation of the financial statements.

Government-Wide Financial Statements

The government-wide financial statements provide a broad view of the Town's operations in a manner that is similar to private businesses. These statements provide both short-term as well as long-term information in regards to the Town's financial position. These financial statements are prepared using the accrual basis of accounting. This measurement focus takes into account all revenues and expenses associated with the fiscal year regardless of when cash is received or paid. The government-wide financial statements include the following two statements:

The Statement of Net Position - this statement presents all of the government's assets, deferred outflows of resources, liabilities and deferred inflows of resources with the difference being reported as net position.

The Statement of Activities - this statement presents information that shows how the government's net position changed during the period. All changes in net position are reported as soon as the underlying event giving rise to the change occurs, regardless of the timing of the related cash flows.

Both of the above-mentioned financial statements have one column for the type of town activity. The type of activity presented for the Town of Whitefield is:

 Governmental activities - The activities in this section are mostly supported by taxes and intergovernmental revenues (federal and state grants). All of the Town's basic services are reported in governmental activities, which include general government, health and welfare, public safety, public works, cemeteries, education and unclassified.

Fund Financial Statements

A fund is a grouping of related accounts that is used to maintain control over resources that have been segregated for specific activities or objectives. The Town of Whitefield, like other local governments uses fund accounting to ensure and demonstrate compliance with financial related legal requirements. All of the funds of the Town of Whitefield are categorized as governmental funds.

Governmental funds: All of the basic services provided by the Town are financed through governmental funds. Governmental funds are used to account for essentially the same functions reported in governmental activities in the government-wide financial statements. However, unlike the government-wide financial statements, the governmental fund financial statements focus on near-term inflows and outflows of spendable resources. They also focus on the balance of spendable resources available at the end of the fiscal year. Such information will be useful in evaluating the government's near-term financing requirements. This approach is known as the current financial resources measurement focus and the modified accrual basis of accounting. Under this approach, revenues are recorded when cash is received or when susceptible to accrual. Expenditures are recorded when liabilities are incurred and due. These statements provide a detailed short-term view of the Town's finances to assist in determining whether there will be adequate financial resources available to meet the current needs of the Town.

Because the focus of governmental funds is narrower than that of governmentwide financial statements, it is useful to compare the information presented for
governmental funds with similar information presented for governmental activities in the
government-wide financial statements. By doing so, readers may better understand the
long-term impact of the government's near-term financing decisions. Both the
governmental funds balance sheet and the governmental funds statement of revenues,
expenditures and changes in fund balances provide a reconciliation to facilitate this
comparison between governmental funds and governmental activities. These
reconciliations are presented on the page immediately following each governmental fund
financial statement.

The Town of Whitefield presents two columns in the governmental funds balance sheet and the governmental funds statement of revenues, expenditures and changes in fund balances. The Town's major governmental fund is the general fund. All other funds are shown as nonmajor and are combined in the "Other Governmental Funds" column on these statements.

The general fund is the only fund for which the Town legally adopted a budget. The Budgetary Comparison Schedule - Budgetary Basis - Budget and Actual - General Fund provides a comparison of the original and final budget and the actual expenditures for the current year.

Notes to the Financial Statements

The notes provide additional information that is essential to a full understanding of the data provided in the Government-Wide and the Fund Financial Statements. The Notes to Financial Statements can be found following the Reconciliation of the Statement of Revenues, Expenditures and Changes in Fund Balances of the Governmental Funds to the Statement of Activities.

Required Supplementary Information

The basic financial statements are followed by a section of required supplementary information, which includes a Budgetary Comparison Schedule - Budgetary Basis - Budget and Actual - General Fund, Schedule of Changes in Net OPEB Liability, Schedule of Changes in Net OPEB Liability and Related Ratios, Schedule of Contributions - OPEB and Notes to Required Supplementary Information.

Other Supplementary Information

Other supplementary information follows the required supplementary information. These combining and other schedules provide information in regards to nonmajor funds, capital asset activity and other detailed budgetary information for the general fund.

Government-Wide Financial Analysis

Our analysis below focuses on the net position and changes in net position of the Town's governmental activities. The Town's total net position increased by \$508,097 from \$4,348.525 to \$4.856.622.

Unrestricted net position - the part of net position that can be used to finance dayto-day operations without constraints established by debt covenants, enabling legislation or other legal requirements - increased to a balance of \$1,880,092 at the end of this year.

Revenues and Expenses

Revenues for the Town's governmental activities decreased by 3.39%, while total expenses increased by 3.12%. Decreases in revenue were primarily in grants and contributions not restricted to specific programs. Increases in expenses were primarily in public safety, county tax, education and capital outlay, partially offset by decreases in general government, public works and unclassified.

Financial Analysis of the Town's Fund Statements

Governmental funds: The financial reporting focus of the Town's governmental funds is to provide information on near-term inflows, outflows and balances of spendable resources. Such information may be useful in assessing the Town's financial requirements. In particular, unassigned fund balance may serve as a useful measure of a government's financial position at the end of the year and the net resources available for spending.

The changes to total fund balances for the general fund and nonmajor funds occurred due to the regular activity of operations.

Budgetary Highlights

The difference between the original and final budget for the general fund was the use of restricted fund balances.

The general fund actual revenues were in excess of budgeted revenues by \$213,447. This was the result of actual amounts being receipted in excess of the budgeted amounts for all revenue categories except for property taxes and other revenue.

The general fund actual expenditures were under budgeted expenditures by \$116,905. All expenditure categories were within or under budgeted amounts except for cemeteries.

Capital Asset and Debt Administration

Capital Assets

As of June 30, 2023, the net book value of capital assets recorded by the Town increased by \$503,593 from the prior year. This increase was the result of current year capital additions of \$612,933 less depreciation expense of \$109,340.

Debt

At June 30, 2023, the Town had \$466,156 in bonds payable versus \$502,913 in the prior year. Refer to Note 6 in the Notes to Financial Statements for more detailed information regarding the long-term debt.

Economic Factors and Next Year's Budgets and Rates

The 2023 - 2024 budget could be severely impacted by the reduction of funding from the State. There is no indication of reduced funding from the State for 2023 - 2024 as of the date this report was issued.

The Town has steadily maintained a sufficient undesignated fund balance to sustain government operations for a period of approximately four months, while also maintaining significant reserve accounts for future capital and program needs.

NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES(CONTINUED)

Reporting Entity

The Town of Whitefield was incorporated under the laws of the State of Maine. The Town operates under the selectmen-manager form of government and provides the following services: general government, health and welfare, public safety, public works, cemeteries, education and unclassified.

The Town's financial statements are prepared in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP). The Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) is responsible for establishing GAAP for state and local governments through its pronouncements (Statements and Interpretations).

The Town's combined financial statements include all accounts and all operations of the Town. We have determined that the Town has no component units as described in GASB Statement No. 14 and amended by GASB Statements No. 39 and No. 61.

Implementation of New Accounting Standards

During the year ended June 30, 2023, the following statements of financial accounting standards issued by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board became effective:

Statement No. 94 "Public-Private and Public-Public Partnerships and Availability Payment Arrangements". The primary objective of this Statement is to improve financial reporting by addressing issues related to public-private and public-public partnership arrangements (PPPs). As used in this Statement, a PPP is an arrangement in which a government (the transferor) contracts with an operator (a governmental or nongovernmental entity) to provide public services by conveying control of the right to operate or use a nonfinancial asset, such as infrastructure or other capital asset (the underlying PPP asset), for a period of time in an exchange or exchange-like transaction. Some PPPs meet the definition of a service concession arrangement (SCA), which the Board defines in this Statement as a PPP in which (1) the operator collects and is compensated by fees from third parties; (2) the transferor determines or has the ability to modify or approve which services the operator is required to provide, to whom the operator is required to provide the services and the prices or rates that can be charged for the services and (3) the transferor is entitled to significant residual interest in the service utility of the underlying PPP asset at the end of the arrangement. Management has determined the impact of this Statement is not material to the financial statements.

NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

Statement No. 96 "Subscription-Based Information Technology Arrangements". This Statement provides guidance on the accounting and financial reporting for subscription-based information technology arrangements (SBITAs) for government end users (governments). This Statement (1) defines a SBITA; (2) establishes that a SBITA results in a right-to-use subscription asset - an intangible asset - and a corresponding subscription liability; (3) provides the capitalization criteria for outlays other than subscription payments, including implementation costs of a SBITA and (4) requires note disclosures regarding a SBITA. To the extent relevant, the standards for SBITAs are based on the standards established in Statement No. 87, Leases, as amended. Management has determined the impact of this Statement is not material to the financial statements.

Statement No. 99 "Omnibus 2022". The objectives of this Statement are to enhance comparability in accounting and financial reporting and to improve the consistency of authoritative literature by addressing (1) practice issues that have been identified during implementation and application of certain GASB Statements and (2) accounting and financial reporting for financial guarantees. The practice issues addressed by this Statement are to provide clarification of provisions in Statement No. 87. Leases, as amended, related to the determination of the lease term, classification of a lease as a short-term lease, recognition and measurement of a lease liability and a lease asset and identification of lease incentives, clarification of provisions in Statement No. 94, Public-Private and Public-Public Partnerships and Availability Payment Arrangements, related to (a) the determination of the public-private and public-public partnership (PPP) term and (b) recognition and measurement of installment payments and the transfer of the underlying PPP asset, clarification of provisions in Statement No. 96, Subscription-Based Information Technology Arrangements, related to the subscription-based information technology arrangement (SBITA) term, classification of a SBITA as a short-term SBITA and recognition and measurement of a subscription liability. extension of the period during which the London Interbank Offered Rate (LIBOR) is considered an appropriate benchmark interest rate for the qualitative evaluation of the effectiveness of an interest rate swap that hedges the interest rate risk of taxable debt, accounting for the distribution of benefits as part of the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), disclosures related to nonmonetary transactions, pledges of future revenues when resources are not received by the pledging government, clarification of provisions in Statement No. 34, Basic Financial Statements - and Management's Discussion and Analysis - for State and Local Governments, as amended, related to the focus of the government-wide financial statements, terminology updates related to certain provisions of Statement No. 63, Financial Reporting of Deferred Outflows of Resources, Deferred Inflows of Resources and Net Position and terminology used in Statement 53 to refer to resource flows statements. Management has determined the impact of this Statement is not material to the financial statements.

Government-Wide and Fund Financial Statements

The Town's basic financial statements include both government-wide (reporting the Town as a whole) and fund financial statements (reporting the Town's major funds).

Both the government-wide and fund financial statements categorize primary activities as either governmental or business-type. All of the Town's activities are categorized as governmental.

In the government-wide Statement of Net Position, the governmental activities column is (a) presented on a consolidated basis by column and (b) is reported on a full accrual, economic resources basis, which recognizes all long-term assets and receivables as well as long-term debt and obligations. The Town's net position is reported in three parts - net investment in capital assets, restricted net position and unrestricted net position. The Town first utilizes restricted resources to finance qualifying activities.

The government-wide Statement of Activities reports both the gross and net cost of each of the Town's functions (general government, public safety, etc.) excluding fiduciary activities. The functions are also supported by general government revenues (property taxes, certain intergovernmental revenues, miscellaneous revenues, etc.). The Statement of Activities reduces gross expenses (including depreciation) by related program revenues, operating and capital grants. Program revenues must be directly associated with the function. Operating grants include operating-specific and discretionary (either operating or capital) grants while the capital grants column reflects capital-specific grants. For the most part, the interfund activity has been eliminated from these government-wide financial statements.

The net costs (by function) are normally covered by general revenue (taxes, certain intergovernmental revenues and charges for services, etc.).

The Town does not allocate indirect costs. All costs are charged directly to the corresponding department.

The government-wide focus is more on the sustainability of the Town as an entity and the change in the Town's net position resulting from the current year's activities.

Measurement Focus - Basic Financial Statements and Fund Financial Statements

The financial transactions of the Town are reported in the individual funds in the fund financial statements. Each fund is accounted for by providing a separate set of self-balancing accounts that comprise its assets, deferred outflows of resources, liabilities, deferred inflows of resources, fund balances, revenues and expenditures/expenses. The

various funds are reported by generic classification within the financial statements. The following fund types are used by the Town:

Governmental Funds:

The focus of the governmental funds' measurement (in the fund statements) is upon determination of financial position (sources, uses and balances of financial resources) rather than upon net income. The following is a description of the governmental funds of the Town:

Major Fund

a. The General Fund is the general operating fund of the Town. It is used to account for all financial resources except those required to be accounted for in another fund.

Nonmajor Funds

- Special Revenue Funds are used to account for the proceeds of specific revenue sources that are legally restricted to expenditures for specified purposes.
- Capital Projects Funds are used to account for financial resources to be used for the acquisition or construction of major capital facilities or equipment.
- d. Permanent Funds are used to account for assets held by the Town that are legally restricted pursuant to Title 30-A, §5653 of the Maine State Statutes, as amended and unless otherwise specified, only earnings may be used for purposes that benefit the Town or its citizenry. The Town's policy for authorizing and spending investment income follows State statutes.

The emphasis in fund financial statements is on the major funds in the governmental activities category. Nonmajor funds by category are summarized into a single column. GASB Statement No. 34 sets forth minimum criteria (percentage of the assets, deferred outflows of resources, liabilities, deferred inflows of resources, revenues or expenses of either the fund category or the governmental and enterprise combined) for the determination of major funds. The nonmajor funds are combined in a column in the fund financial statements.

Basis of Accounting

Basis of accounting refers to when revenues and expenditures or expenses are recognized in the accounts and reported in the financial statements. Basis of accounting relates to the timing of the measurements made, regardless of the measurement focus applied.

Accrual

Governmental activities in the government-wide financial statements are presented on the accrual basis of accounting. Revenues are recognized when earned and expenses are recognized when incurred.

Modified Accrual

The governmental fund financial statements are presented on the modified accrual basis of accounting. Under the modified accrual basis of accounting, revenues are recorded when susceptible to accrual; i.e., both measurable and available. "Available" means collectible within the current period or soon enough thereafter to be used to pay liabilities of the current period. Expenditures are generally recognized under the modified accrual basis of accounting when the related liability is incurred. The exception to this general rule is that principal and interest on general obligation long-term debt, if any, is recognized when due.

Budget

The Town's policy is to adopt an annual budget for operations. The budget is presented on the modified accrual basis of accounting which is consistent with generally accepted accounting principles.

The following procedures are followed in establishing budgetary data reflected in the financial statements:

- Early in the second half of the year the Town prepares a budget for the fiscal year beginning July 1. The operating budget includes proposed expenditures and the means of financing them.
- A meeting of the inhabitants of the Town was called for the purpose of adopting the proposed budget after public notice of the meeting was given.
- The budget was adopted subsequent to passage by the inhabitants of the Town.

Deposits and Investments

The Town's cash and cash equivalents are considered to be cash on hand, demand deposits and short-term investments with original maturities of three months or less from the date of acquisition.

It is the Town's policy to value investments at fair value. None of the Town's investments are reported at amortized cost. The Town Treasurer is authorized by State Statutes to invest all excess funds in the following:

- Obligations of the U.S. Government, its agencies and instrumentalities
- Certificates of deposit and other evidence of deposits at banks, savings and loan associations and credit unions
- Repurchase agreements
- Money market mutual funds

The Town of Whitefield has no formal investment policy but instead follows the State of Maine Statutes.

Receivables

Receivables include amounts due from governmental agencies and local businesses. All receivables are current and therefore due within one year. Receivables are reported net of an allowance for uncollectible accounts and revenues net of uncollectibles. Allowances are reported when accounts are proven to be uncollectible. The allowance for uncollectible accounts is estimated to be \$0 as of June 30, 2023. Accounts receivable netted with allowances for uncollectible accounts were \$2,212 for the year ended June 30, 2023.

Prepaid Items

Certain payments to vendors reflect costs applicable to future accounting periods and are recorded as prepaid items in both government-wide and fund financial statements. The cost of prepaid items is recorded as expenditures/expenses when consumed rather than when purchased.

Interfund Receivables and Payables

Transactions between funds that are representative of lending/borrowing arrangements outstanding at the end of the fiscal year are referred to as "due to/from other funds". While these balances are reported in fund financial statements, certain

eliminations are made in preparation of the government-wide financial statements. Any residual balances outstanding between governmental activities and business-type activities are reported in the governmental-wide financial statements as "internal balances".

Transactions Between Funds

Legally authorized transfers are treated as interfund transfers and are included in the results of operations of the Governmental Funds.

Capital Assets

Capital assets purchased or acquired with an original cost of \$5,000 or more are reported at historical cost or estimated historical cost. Additions, improvements and other capital outlays that significantly extend the useful life of an asset are capitalized. Infrastructure such as streets, traffic signals and signs are capitalized. Other costs incurred for repairs and maintenance are expensed as incurred. Depreciation on all assets is provided on the straight-line basis over the estimated useful lives.

The assets are valued at historical cost when available and estimated historical cost where actual invoices or budgetary data was unavailable. Donated capital assets are reported at their estimated fair market value on the date received. All retirements have been recorded by eliminating the net carrying values. The Town has artwork that has been capitalized as art and historical items. These items are categorized as non-depreciable assets as they are considered inexhaustible.

Infrastructure assets include roads, bridges, underground pipe (other than related to independently owned utilities), traffic signals, etc. These infrastructure assets are likely to be the largest asset class of the Town. The Town has not retroactively recorded infrastructure.

Estimated useful lives are as follows:

Long-term Obligations

The accounting treatment of long-term obligations depends on whether the assets are used in governmental fund operations or proprietary fund operations and whether they are reported in the government-wide or fund financial statements.

All long-term obligations to be repaid from governmental and business-type resources are reported as liabilities in government-wide statements. The long-term obligations consist of bonds payable, accrued compensated absences and net OPEB liability.

Long-term debt for governmental funds is not reported as liabilities in the fund financial statements. The debt proceeds are reported as other financing sources and payment of principal and interest reported as expenditures. The accounting for proprietary funds is the same in the fund statements as it is in the government-wide statements

OPEB

For purposes of measuring the net OPEB liability, deferred outflows of resources and deferred inflows of resources related to OPEB, management received and relied on an actuarial report provided to them by the Maine Municipal Employees Health Trust (MMEHT), which determined the Town's fiduciary net position as a single employer defined benefit plan based on information provided solely by MMEHT to complete the actuarial report. Additions to/deductions from the MMEHT OPEB Plan's fiduciary net position have been determined on the same basis as they are reported by MMEHT. For this purpose, benefit payments (including refunds of employee contributions) are recognized when due and payable in accordance with the benefit terms.

Net Position

Net position represents the difference between all other elements in a statement of financial position. Net investment in capital assets consists of capital assets, net of accumulated depreciation, reduced by the outstanding balances of any borrowing used for those assets and adding back unspent proceeds. Net position is reported as restricted when there are limitations imposed on their use either through the enabling legislations adopted by the Town or through external restrictions imposed by creditors, grantors or laws or regulations of other governments. Unrestricted net position is the net amount of the assets, deferred outflows of resources, liabilities and deferred inflows of resources that are not included in the determination of net investment in capital assets or restricted net position.

Fund Balances

In the fund financial statements, fund balance for governmental funds is reported in classifications that comprise a hierarchy based primarily on the extent to which the Town is bound to honor constraints on the specific purpose for which amounts in the funds can be spent. Fund balance is reported in five components - nonspendable, restricted, committed, assigned and unassigned.

Nonspendable - This includes amounts that cannot be spent either because they are not in spendable form or because they are legally or contractually required to be maintained intact.

Restricted - This includes amounts that can be spent only for specific purposes because of constitutional provisions or enabling legislation or because of constraints that are externally imposed by creditors, grantors, contributors or the laws or regulations of other governments.

Committed - This includes amounts that can be used only for specific purposes determined by a formal action of the inhabitants of the Town. The inhabitants of the Town through Town meetings are the highest level of decision-making authority of the Town. Commitments may be established, modified or rescinded only through a Town meeting vote.

Assigned - This includes amounts that do not meet the criteria to be classified as restricted or committed but that are intended to be used for specific purposes. The authority for assigning fund balance is given annually by vote of the taxpayer and is expressed by the Selectboard.

Unassigned - This includes all other spendable amounts. The general fund is the only fund that reports a positive unassigned fund balance amount. Other governmental funds besides the general fund can only report a negative unassigned fund balance amount

When an expenditure is incurred for purposes for which both restricted and unrestricted fund balances are available, the Town considers restricted funds to have been spent first. When an expenditure is incurred for which committed, assigned or unassigned fund balances are available, the Town considers amounts to have been spent first out of committed funds, then assigned funds and finally unassigned funds, as needed, unless the Town meeting vote has provided otherwise in its commitment or assignment actions.

Deferred Outflows and Inflows of Resources

In addition to assets, the statement of financial position and/or balance sheet will at times report a separate section for deferred outflows of resources. This separate financial statement element, deferred outflows of resources, represents a consumption of net position that applies to a future period(s) and so will not be recognized as an outflow of resources (expense/expenditure) until then. The Town only has one type of this item, deferred outflows related to OPEB, that qualifies for reporting in this category. This item is reported in the statement of net position.

In addition to liabilities, the statement of financial position and/or balance sheet will at times report a separate section for deferred inflows of resources. This separate financial statement element, deferred inflows of resources, represents an acquisition of net position that applies to a future period(s) and so will not be recognized as an inflow of resources (revenue) until that time. Deferred tax revenues, which arises only under a modified accrual basis of accounting, qualifies for reporting in this category. Accordingly, this item is reported in the governmental funds balance sheet. Prepaid taxes also qualify for reporting in this category. This item is reported in both the statements of net position and governmental funds balance sheet. The Town also has deferred inflows related to OPEB that qualifies for reporting in this category. This items is reported in the statement of net position. All items in this category are deferred and recognized as an inflow of resources in the period that the amounts become available.

Revenue Recognition - Property Taxes - Modified Accrual Basis

The Town's property tax for the current year was levied September 13, 2022 on the assessed value listed as of April 1, 2022, for all real and personal property located in the Town. Taxes were due on in two installments on November 29, 2022 and April 28, 2023. Interest on unpaid taxes commenced on November 30, 2022 and April 29, 2023 at 4% per annum.

Property tax revenues are recognized when they become available. Available includes those property tax receivables expected to be collected within sixty days after year end. The remaining receivables have been recorded as deferred revenues.

The Town is permitted by the laws of the State of Maine to levy taxes up to 105% of its net budgeted expenditures for the related fiscal period. The amount raised in excess of 100% is referred to as overlay and amounted to \$13,426 for the year ended June 30, 2023

Tax liens are placed on real property within twelve months following the tax commitment date if taxes are delinquent. The Town has the authority to foreclose on property eighteen months after the filing of the lien if tax liens and associated costs remain unpaid.

Program Revenues

Program revenues include all directly related income items applicable to a particular program (charges to customers or applicants for goods, services or privileges provided, operating or capital grants and contributions, including special assessments).

Encumbrance Accounting

Encumbrances are not liabilities and, therefore, are not recorded as expenditures until receipt of material or service. For budgetary purposes, appropriations lapse at fiscal year-end. The Town does not utilize encumbrance accounting for its general fund.

Use of Estimates

During the preparation of the Town's financial statements, management is required to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets, liabilities and disclosure of contingent items as of the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses/expenditures during the reporting period. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

NOTE 2 - DEPOSITS AND INVESTMENTS

State statutes require that all investments made by the Town consider the safe and sound investment of principal and preservation of capital in the overall portfolio, maintenance of sufficient liquidity to meet day-to-day operations and other cash requirements and maximization of income, within established investment risk guidelines, with consistent cash flows throughout the budgetary cycle. These investment policies apply to all Town funds.

Deposits:

Custodial credit risk for deposits is the risk that, in the event of a failure of a depository financial institution, the Town will not be able to recover its deposits. The Town does not have a policy covering custodial credit risk for deposits. However, the Town maintains deposits in qualifying financial institutions that are a member of the FDIC or NCUSIF as defined in Title 30-A, Section 5706 of the Maine Revised Statutes.

At June 30, 2023, the Town's cash balances amounting to \$1,991,477 were comprised of bank deposits of \$1,989,527. Bank deposits are adjusted primarily by outstanding checks and deposits in transit to reconcile to the Town's cash balance. Of this balance, \$1,989,527 was insured by federal depository insurance and consequently was not exposed to custodial credit risk.

Investments:

Custodial credit risk for investments is that, in the event of failure of the counterparty, the Town will not be able to recover the value of its investments or collateral securities that are in possession of an outside party. Currently, the Town does not have a policy for custodial credit risk for investments.

Interest rate risk - is the risk that changes in interest rates will adversely affect the fair value of an investment. The Town does not have a formal investment policy that limits investment maturities as a means of managing its exposure to fair value losses arising from fluctuations in interest rates. Certificates of deposit held with local financial institutions for \$1,428 are excluded from interest rate risk as these investments are considered held to maturity and are therefore not measured at fair value.

At June 30, 2023, the Town's investments of \$1,428 was comprised of a certificate of deposit which was fully collateralized with federal depository insurance and consequently not exposed to custodial credit

Credit risk - Statutes for the State of Maine authorize the Town to invest in obligations of the U.S. Treasury, agencies and instrumentalities, other states and Canada, provided such securities are rated within the three highest grades by an approved rating service of the State of Maine, corporate stocks and bonds within statutory limits, financial institutions, mutual funds and repurchase agreements. The Town does not have an investment policy on credit risk. Generally, the Town invests excess funds in repurchase agreements, savings accounts and various insured certificates of deposit.

NOTE 8 - ACCRUED COMPENSATED ABSENCES

The Town's policies regarding vacation and sick time permit employees to accumulate earned but unused vacation leave. The liability for these compensated absences is recorded as long-term obligations in the government-wide financial statements. In the fund financial statements, governmental funds report only the compensated absence liability payable from expendable available financial resources, while the proprietary funds report the liability as it is incurred. As of June 30, 2023, the Town's liability for compensated absences is \$6,266.

NOTE 16 - RISK MANAGEMENT

The Town is exposed to various risks of loss related to torts; theft of, damage to and destruction of assets; errors and omissions and natural disasters for which the Town participates in a public entity risk pool sponsored by the Maine Municipal Association. The Maine Municipal Association Group Risk Pool is a state-chartered pool established exclusively for Maine municipalities. The pool provides certain property, liability, fidelity and vehicle coverage. If the assets of the pool are at any time actuarially determined to be insufficient to enable the pool to discharge its legal obligations, other obligations and actuarially sound reserves, the pool has the power to make up the deficiency by the levy of a prorated assessment. There have been no deficiencies during the past three years and management believes that no deficiency exists at June 30, 2023.

Based on the coverage provided by the insurance purchased, the Town is not aware of any material actual or potential claim liabilities which should be recorded as of June 30, 2023. There were no significant reductions in insurance coverage from that of the prior year and amounts of settlements have not exceeded insurance coverage in the past three years.

MAINE MUNICIPAL EMPLOYEES' HEALTH TRUST

Plan Description

The Town and the Town's retirees contribute to the Town's OPEB Plan with the Maine Municipal Employees Health Trust (MMEHT), a single employer defined benefit plan. Contributions and membership in this Plan are voluntary and may be terminated at any time by the Town and/or the Town's retirees. MMEHT is a fully funded, self-insured trust which provides benefits to municipal and quasi-municipal organizations and county governments and acts as the agent to the Town concerning administration of this Plan. Title 24-A Chapter 81 of the Maine Revised Statutes Annotated authorizes the regulation of MMEHT as a Multiple Employer Welfare Arrangement by the State of Maine Bureau of Insurance. Benefits and plans are designed and governed by MMEHT participants and are administered by a number of third-party administrators contracted by MMEHT. No assets are accumulated in a trust that meets the criterial of paragraph 4 of GASB Statement No. 75, Accounting and Financial Reporting for Postemployment Benefits Other Than Pensions. MMEHT issues a publicly available financial report that includes financial statements and required supplementary information. That report may be obtained by MMEHT at (800) 852-8300.

Benefits Provided

This Plan provides medical/prescription drug benefits during retirement to Medicare and non-Medicare retirees and their surviving spouses with varying levels of benefits determined by voluntary plan selection by the retiree as well as applicable Medicare statutes and regulations. The Plan also provides an automatic life insurance benefit of \$2,000 to participants which includes a surviving spouse benefit for the same. The employee must meet the minimum requirement of age 55 with at least 5 years of service at retirement to be eligible for the Plan. The retiree must enroll when first eligible and continue coverage without interruption.

Contributions

Retiree and spouse premium amounts are funded by the retiree at the rate for the coverage elected by the retiree. Premium rates are those determined by the MMEHT's Board of Trustees to be actuarially sufficient to pay anticipated claims. Premiums for retiree life insurance coverage are factored into the premiums paid for basic coverage. Retirees and spouses must contribute 100% of the premium amounts. The sponsoring employer pays the remainder of the premium. Medical benefits are provided for the life of the retiree and surviving spouses.

At June 30, 2023, the Town reported a liability of \$5,201 for its total OPEB liability for this Plan. The total OPEB liability was measured as of January 1, 2023 and was determined by an actuarial valuation as of that date. The Town's total OPEB liability was based on the Entry Age Normal Actuarial Cost Method which does not reflect future changes in benefits, subsidies, penalties, taxes or administrative costs that may be required as a result of the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act of 2010 (ACA) related legislation and regulations.

Discount Rate

The discount rate is the assumed interest rate used for converting projected dollar related values to a present value as of the valuation date of January 1, 2023. The discount rate determination is based on the high-quality AA/Aa or higher bond yields in effect for 20-year, tax-exempt general obligation municipal bonds using the Bond Buyer 20-Bond GO Index. Actuarial Methods and Assumptions

The total OPEB liability for the Plan was determined by an actuarial valuation as of January 1, 2023, using the following methods and assumptions applied to all periods included in the measurement:

Actuarial Cost Method

The Entry Age Normal Actuarial Cost Method is used to determine costs. Under this funding method, a normal cost rate is determined as a level percent of pay for each active Plan member and then summed to produce the total normal cost for this Plan. The unfunded actuarial liability is the difference between the actuarial liability and the actuarial value of assets.

For medical and pharmacy, historical claims and census records were assembled and provided through June 30, 2021. Medicare and non-Medicare eligible medical and prescription experience were analyzed. It was assumed that current enrollment distribution of benefit options would remain constant in the future for retirees. The cost was distributed based on the current covered population and the actuary's standard age curves which vary by age, gender and Medicare status. Children costs are converted to a load on the non-Medicare retirees which implicitly assumes that future retirees will have the same child distribution as current retirees.

Assumptions

The actuarial assumptions used in the January 1, 2023 actuarial valuation were adopted by the Maine State Retirement Consolidated Plan for Participating Local Districts as of June 30, 2021 and based on the experience study covering the period from June 30, 2016 through June 30, 2020. As of January 1, 2023, they are as follows:

Discount Rate - 3.72% per annum for year end 2023 reporting. 2.06% per annum for 2022 year end reporting.

Trend Assumptions:

Medical Trend assumptions were developed using the Society of Actuaries (SOA) Long-Run Medical Cost Trend Model. The SOA model was released in December 2007 and version 2023_fl was used for this valuation. The following assumptions were input into this model:

The SOA Long-Run Medical Cost Trend Model and its baseline projection are based on an econometric analysis of historical U.S. medical expenditures and the judgements of experts in the field. The long-run baseline projection and input variables have been developed under the guidance of the SOA Project Oversight Group. The rate for the extra trend for taste and technology was set above the baseline of 1.1% (to 1.2%) to move closer to the 30-year average to reflect the future projections from the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services Office of the Actuary (CMS OACT). The Medicare Trustee Report and CBO Long-Term Budget Outlook.

The trends selected from 2023 to 2026 were based on plan design, population weighting, renewal projections and market analysis. For years 2027 - 2031, these are interpolated from 2026 to 2032 (which is the product of the inflation, GDP and extra trend rate assumptions).

Deductibles, Co-payments and Out of Pocket Maximums are assumed to increase at the above trend rates. The ultimate trend rate reflects an assumed nominal per capital GDP growth.

Administrative and claims expense: 3% per annum

Significant actuarial assumptions employed by the actuary for demographic purposes are the assumptions that were adopted by Maine State Retirement Consolidated Plan for Participating Local District at June 30, 2016 and based on the experience study covering the period from June 30, 2012 through June 30, 2015. As of January 1, 2021, they are as follows:

Retirement Rates - Rates vary for plans with no explicit employer subsidy (or payment) versus those plans defining an explicit employer subsidy (or payment). The rates are based on assumptions from the Maine State Retirement Consolidated Plan for Participating Local District at June 30, 2021.

Retirement Contribution Increases - Assumed to increase at the same rate as incurred claims. A constant cost sharing in plan design between employer and employees is assumed.

Family Enrollment Composition - For males, 50% of future retirees under the age of 65 and 50% of current retirees are married and elect spousal coverage while females are at 30% for both. 25% of male and female future retirees over the age of 65 are married and elect spousal coverage.

Age Difference of Spouses - Husbands are assumed to be 3 years older than wives

Administrative expenses - Included in the per capita claims cost.

Disability Incidence - Disabled lives will be considered active employees and will not be valued separately.

Salary Increase Rate - 2.75% per year assumed using the level percentage of pay entry age method.

Dates of Hire - Needed to be assumed for some employees and will be based on the average age at hire for similar employees.

Rate of Mortality:

Healthy Annuitant- Based on 112.1% and 118.5% of the 2010 Public Plan General Benefits-Weighted Healthy Retiree Mortality Table, respectively, for males and females. The proposed rates are projected generationally using the RPEC_2020 model, with an ultimate rate of 1.00% for ages 80 and under, grading down to 0.05% at age 95 and further grading down to 0.00% at age 115, along with convergence to the ultimate rates in the year 2027. All other parameters used in the RPEC_2020 model are those included in the published MP-2020 scale. As prescribed by the Trust, mortality rates were taken from the assumptions for the Maine State Retirement Consolidated Plan for Participating Local Districts at June 30, 2021.

Active Employees - Rates of mortality are based on 83.5% and 88.6% of the 2010 Public Plan General Benefits- Weighted Employee Mortality Table, respectively, for males and females. These rates are generationally projected using the same version of the RPEC_2020 model as described in the healthy annuitant mortality. As prescribed by the Trust, mortality rates were taken from the assumptions for the Maine State Retirement Consolidated Plan for Participating Local Districts at June 30, 2021.

Retiree Continuation Percentage:

Medicare participant retirees - 100% assumed to continue in the plan elected.

Pre-Medicare plan retirees and active participants - 75% assumed to continue coverage once Medicare-eligible

Pre-Medicare plan spouses and spouses of active participants - 50% assumed to continue coverage once Medicare-eligible

Changes in Net OPEB Liability

Changes in net OPEB liability are recognized in OPEB expense for the year ended June 30, 2023 with the following exceptions:

Differences between Expected and Actual Experience

The difference between expected and actual experience are recognized in OPEB expense using a straight-line amortization method over a closed period equal to the average expected remaining service lives of active and inactive members in each plan. The first year is recognized as OPEB expense and the remaining years are shown as either deferred outflows of resources or deferred inflows of resources. The difference between expected and actual experience as of January 1, 2023 was (\$6,941).

Changes in Assumptions

Differences due to changes in assumptions about future economic, demographic or claim and expense factors or other inputs are recognized in OPEB expense using a straight-line amortization method over a closed period equal to the average expected remaining service lives of active and inactive members in each plan. The actuarial assumptions used in the January 1, 2022 actuarial valuation were adopted by the Maine State Retirement Consolidated Plan for Participating Local Districts as of June 30, 2021 and based on the experience study covering the period from June 30, 2016 through June 30, 2020. The first year is recognized as OPEB expense and the remaining years are shown as either deferred outflows of resources or deferred inflows of resources.

Differences between Projected and Actual Earnings on OPEB Plan Investments

Differences between projected and actual investment earnings are recognized in OPEB expense using a straight-line amortization method over a closed five-year period. The first year is recognized as OPEB expense and the remaining years are shown as either deferred outflows of resources or deferred inflows of resources.

Requests to be placed on the agenda should be submitted the Wednesday before the meeting to the town office or via email either to the Planning Board chair at townwhitefieldpb@gmail.com or the town at townwhitefieldadm@gmail.com. All Town ordinances can be found on the Town's website. Meeting agendas and minutes are posted there as well.

The Town approved changes to the Building and Development Ordinance at its March 2023 town meeting.

A big issue faced by the Board in the spring was a proposal to convert the old Coopers Mills Nursing Home facility into a residential living facility for recovering alcoholics and drug addicts. This generated a lot of talk before the Board in April, May, June and July. In the end the Board found that the change in use required a permit from the Board under the Town's Building and Development Ordinance and informed the potential owners of that fact. Since then the Board has heard nothing further on the proposal.

The Board is currently working on updating the Town's Subdivision Ordinance. The current version was last amended in 1989 and does not reflect substantial changes in state statutes approved by legislatures since then. While there may be some other minor changes, the bulk of the effort is to bring it into statutory compliance. This will be brought before the Town at its March 2024 town meeting.

Other issues the Board has faced include a request to re-authorize a medical marijuana grow facility on North Howe Road, activities around an old store building near the old dam site in Coopers Mills, multiple issues related to historical lots with insufficient road frontage or size, and issues with tree clearing of a lot on Hornpout Lane on the south shore of Clary Lake. The Board also developed an application form for the licensing of a medical marijuana grow facility.

Local Plumbing Inspector Report

During the calendar year 2023, a total of **31** plumbing permits were issued to residents in the following areas:

13 – Internal Plumbing permits

15 – Subsurface Wastewater permits

1 - Variances

As with all Towns in Maine, the State Internal Plumbing Code and State Subsurface Wastewater Regulations are in effect. All residents should be mindful that for all plumbing whether new, replacement, internal and/or external, permits are required before work begins and an inspection is required prior to completion by the Plumbing Inspector for compliance. If you have an upcoming plumbing project and have questions on what permits and inspections will be required, feel free to contact me with any questions.

Keep in mind that the best way to maintain your septic system is to pump your septic tank on a regular basis. Over time, tanks fill with solids, which accumulate on the bottom and build up. Not only do the accumulating solids reduce the effective capacity of the septic tank, but can cause catastrophic damage if allowed to build to the point where they flow out into your leach field. Considering the cost to install a new septic system (\$8,000 and up), pumping your tank once every 2-4 years for \$300-\$500 is money well spent!

Whitefield EMS Report

Dear Residents of Whitefield

It is with great pride that I present to you the 2023 annual report for Whitefield EMS. This report highlights our organization's personnel status, operational performance, and financial situation in the past year. Our small but dedicated team has worked hard to provide emergency medical services to our community, and this report demonstrates our commitment to transparency and accountability.

Whitefield EMS is currently comprised of two Emergency Medical Technicians (EMT) and one Emergency Medical Responder (EMR). All of which are licensed by the state of Maine and nationally registered healthcare providers. While professionally trained and licensed, all are volunteers and respond to 911 emergency calls when they are available and able.

In 2023 the town of Whitefield's brief experiment with establishing a paid on call EMT at the Central Station part time ended in May when Ben Caron, our previous Director (and most highly qualified EMT) accepted a position in another town and resigned from our service. In retrospect, the 24 hour a week flexible on-call EMT schedule did not line up well with the reality of the random timing of medical emergencies in Whitefield so we have not continued the program since Ben's departure.

I feel it is important for the town to understand that we do not currently have the manning or financial capacity to have dedicated on-call schedules for our service. Our operations continue to be centered around delivering high-quality emergency medical care prior to the arrival of a transporting ambulance service. Throughout the year, we have responded to a wide range of emergencies, including medical emergencies and trauma incidents. We have diligently worked to maintain the highest standards of care, ensuring that our patients receive timely and appropriate medical attention.

In the past year, Whitefield EMS has been paged out for 164 Medical Emergency calls by the 911 Dispatcher. We were able to respond to 100 (61%) of those emergency calls, ensuring prompt and efficient medical assistance to Whitefield. The greatest limiting factor to our ability to improve our response rate is the small number of volunteers we currently have available to respond. We are optimistic about the future in this regard as we have several new firefighters and two other members of our Whitefield community that have expressed interest in taking an EMT training course and joining our team. The availability of seats in courses nearby is limited but we are aggressively seeking out opportunities.

The annual operating budget of the Whitefield EMS is a subset of the Fire Department's budget. Our primary expenditures are for training of EMS personnel and replacement medical equipment, supplies and medications. We

were fortunate in 2023 and were able to secure tuition for the two EMT training courses from an outside grant allowing us to carryover a significant portion of our "training" budget for the first half of 2024 where we expect to send several more individuals to an EMT training course. The bulk of the equipment and supplies budget for 2023 was used to restock EMT response kits, purchase new stethoscopes as well as replace batteries in our AEDs.

In conclusion, the past year has been one of progress for Whitefield EMS. I am immensely grateful for the dedicated efforts of our team, our valued partners, and the trust placed in us by our community. Moving forward, we remain steadfast in our commitment to providing prompt, professional, and compassionate emergency medical services. We will continue to adapt, innovate, and grow to

meet the evolving needs of Whitefield. Thank you for your continued support.

EMS and Firefighting Task Force Report

Faced with declining First Responders and Firefighters, a group of concerned volunteers began meeting in August, 2022 to explore building recruitment and retention for Whitefield Fire & Rescue.

The following topics were discussed: Proposals to attract/keep members; compensation and benefits; legislation; attending county/local meetings; constructing a training building; regionalization; grants and fundraising; and Delta Ambulance.

The Task Force was successful in increasing the visibility of the fire department in the Whitefield community; conducting low-effort recruiting activities and considering higher-effort cost steps that might increase recruitment, retention and/or the level of participation.

The group concluded that the problem is enduring and nationwide. It will have to be addressed on a continuing basis. Some discussions were held regarding regional approaches, but this did not go far and should be continued. Whitefield Fire & Rescue personnel shortages need to be addressed through enhanced efforts at both recruitment and retention. In recent years, WF&R has fallen short on both.

The people of Whitefield through the Select Board have been generous in financial support to WF&R in a material sense in the acquisition of apparatus and equipment. But without sufficiently trained and experienced personnel, equipment is useless. Solutions to the problem need action at the level of leadership in WF&R, the selectboard and among the citizens of the town itself.

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Executive Summary

To our Community Partners,

Thank you for the opportunity to bring you information about our company and explain the significance of what we do in our local area. As the Company's new Director, this is my first time writing an annual report for Delta – a company that I've proudly served with since 2014. My career in Emergency Medical Services started in 2002 and has progressed through various agencies across three states. Delta promoted me to Field Supervisor, then Director of Operations, and appointed me as Executive Director in February 2023 following the retirement of Tim Beals. Delta has been a fantastic place to work and I'm very proud to be part of an organization that is so sincerely dedicated to its mission of providing excellent patient care to its patients and customers.

Delta provides 911 service to thirteen communities and interfacility transfer service primarily to two local hospital systems. These two services are distinct in their needs and commitments but intertwine in their benefits to our local communities. Medical emergencies do not stop at the 911 phase and often require definitive care and procedures unavailable locally. Transport to other facilities is crucial to ensuring good outcomes for our patients. Delta provides these necessary services, and more, with a high level of attention to quality.

Despite the realization of some major challenges at the end of the year, 2023 was a year of development and progress in many areas. We were able to formalize and expand our critical care transport program through a pilot project with Maine EMS and are currently the only ground-based ambulance service besides the Lifeflight of Maine's ground division that can transport critically ill patients on ventilators without accompanying hospital personnel. We received a grant from the Mildred H. Mcevoy Foundation which is allowing us to purchase new, state-of-the-art transport ventilators and send field personnel to a Critical Care Transport program. We also explored different scheduling and fleet deployment models to increase efficiency across field operations with the goals of reducing response times and increasing ambulance availability both for 911 coverage and inter-facility transfers.

Concerning sustainability, in July 2023 we implemented service charges for the first time in over fifty years and obtained a term grant from MaineGeneral Health at the end of the year. Also at the year's conclusion, we began preparations to sell our southern station at 10 Cony Rd in Augusta and search for alternative sites that

would be more cost-effective and more appropriately sized for our current operations. A company-wide internal assessment was also initiated to flush out inefficiencies and ensure that we were providing the best possible service while reducing unnecessary expenses.

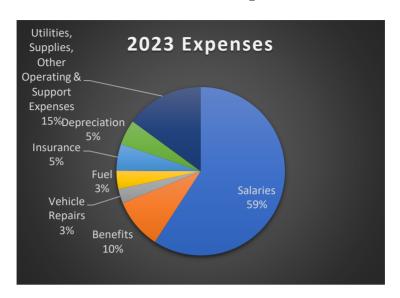
As we move into 2024, we continue to make appropriate and decisive changes with sustainability and quality at the forefront. We are proud to serve the over forty-one thousand people in our coverage area and thank our communities for their continued support in that mission.

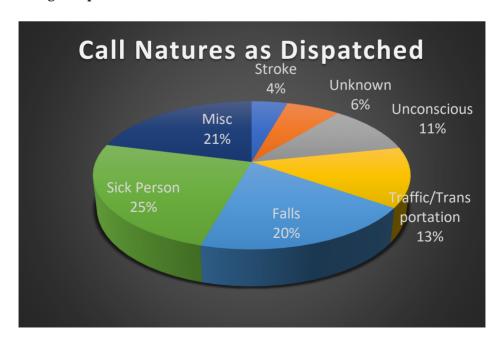
Delta Ambulance had been operating with a significant monthly budget deficit which was projected to deplete financial reserves by early 2024. A combination of low revenue, increased costs, and the reduction/delay in State funding all contributed to the Company's financial state which to that point, had been uncorrected. In late 2023, with that realization, an internal review was started to reduce expenditures wherever possible and secure supplemental income. Immediate measures were taken which included the formal elimination of several senior administrative positions, a reduction in company-wide benefits, a change in fleet deployment and scheduling which regained some lost financial efficiency, and the sale of our Augusta satellite station. These steps were in conjunction with securing a term grant from MGMC and bringing town subsidy amounts closer to a sustainable number.

Looking ahead to 2024 and beyond, we hope to secure balanced subsidies between our two main operational sides – municipal 911 and inter-facility transfers. Between this and the continued refinement of the Company budget, we expect to find a break-even budget by 2025 with the lowest cost possible for all of our customers. This is a work in progress that has been moving in a good direction and I'm confident that Delta will continue to provide needed medical transportation to our area.

Coopers Mills Volunteer Fire Department Report

CMVFD has a long history. After 1947, the "Summer that Maine Burned", there was an increase in the creation of fire departments in many small towns and villages. Coopers Mills was one of those. In 1956, Coopers Mills Volunteer Fire Department became an official Maine Corporation. Over the years, CMVFD kept acquiring and upgrading its equipment, starting with bigger towns' retired vehicles. In 1978, they bought their first brand new vehicle, a one-ton utility truck that carried the Town's cascade system for SCBA bottles, plus lots of other equipment. They acquired a 1978 Brush Truck equipped with a tank and Indian pumps for grass and forest fires. Then in 1992, They bought a brand new 1,000-gallon GMC General tanker/pumper. They took out a loan and paid it off early, all with no tax money going into the purchases. During those years, CMVFD operated on their own budget for operating expenses, which were reimbursed at town meeting. The CMVFD report in the Town Report was primarily a financial report so people could see how their money was spent. Since the Town now pays for maintenance, the financial side is part of the Town budget.

CMVFD has run many different fund-raising events. The most notable being the annual auction. For several generations, it was a tradition that people from far and wide looked forward to. Each August, well over 100 bidders and their families had a great time and bought literally tons of treasures and trash. Covid shut it down for two years, but it has come back to life since. Turkey Bingo, Midnight Golf, and the annual horseshoe tournament have added to the cash flow.

With the creation of the Municipal Fire Department, the number of active firefighters in Coopers Mills has diminished, leaving CMVFD with the primary job of housing the newest of Whitefield's Fire trucks. In the last few years, CMVFD has put over \$200,000 into the building, providing safe efficient housing for the new truck.

We are looking for more members to help preserve the tradition of community support for fire and EMT services in town. We also strongly encourage people to join the Whitefield Firefighters and EMTs who serve Whitefield and the surrounding towns.

The Facilities Committee is charged with providing recommendations to the Select Board on the upkeep and maintenance of Town buildings and properties.

The town buildings are in good shape but need maintenance to keep them in good condition and safe. We are fortunate to have two Fire Associations that fund raise to support their stations and perform much of the needed work themselves. Kip Glidden continues to keep the town office and central fire station clean, and performs maintenance on town buildings with the help of volunteers. Many thanks to the committee members and volunteers who continue to help with projects that come up including building entryway roofs, repairing broken fences, replacing trim, and helping to stay on top of all of the many things to keep our buildings safe and sound. The grader shed has been completed and now protects the town-owned grader. Repair work on the sand shed roof will allow for solar panel expansion in the future. The town currently produces more than 23,000 kWh of solar energy annually

which covers more than half of the use between all town buildings – a significant cost savings which we hope to improve on.

As a reminder: the town-owned property off Rt 17 and Fox Farm Lane has a trail circling the property and running along the West Branch of the Sheepscot River. Thanks to Barry Tibbetts and volunteers with the Lions Club for improving the trail this year. The parking area is plowed in the winter so visit the river when you're in the area.

The Committee meets on the 4th Wednesday of the month at 6pm at the Central Fire Station.

David Boynton has served the town as road commissioner for over 20 years and retired as of town meeting last March. He has served the town well and did his best to keep our roads in good condition.

Dylan Peaslee of Jefferson was hired as our new road commissioner and began work right after town meeting. Dave Boynton spent many hours with Dylan bringing him up to speed as to what he had started and had planned to do but his term ran out before he could accomplish everything. Dylan brings a varied experience and lots of hands-on experience to this new role of hired Road Commissioner.

Some of the highlights of the work that was done in the past year or so includes replacing a large culvert on South Hunts Meadow at Joys Pond outlet with a bridge restoring this outlet to what it had been many years ago.

We have reconstructed several gravel roads utilizing recognized techniques to make them less prone to mud issues. We have a list of other areas that are in need of the same treatment and plan to prioritize the worst areas. We welcome input from those who live on gravel roads to help us set those priorities.

The roads committee has been working to replace street signs and add new ones as new roads are created. All this work has been done by volunteers thereby saving the taxpayers money. This is an ongoing project and we welcome anyone who would be willing to help us drive the stakes for the signs.

The committee has been actively assessing our town roads with ride arounds several times during the year, which helps us determine the locations needing attention. We welcome taxpayers' input bearing in mind that we need to set priorities based on resources and traffic loads.

We are working on developing a system of record keeping that would track what has been done and when.

The Whitefield Roads Committee regularly scheduled meeting is the first Monday of each month at the Kings Mills Fire Station. We do occasionally meet off this schedule, so call the office to confirm the next meeting.

Unfortunately, our budget has been impacted by inflation which has forced us to increase our budget to compensate.

We welcome input from taxpayers keeping in mind that we will be setting priorities based on severity of need and available funds.

Solid Waste Committee Report

Currently Whitefield's trash (that is not recycled) is disposed in Augusta's Hatch Hill Landfill. However, Hatch Hill is nearly full, so in 2022 the Select Board convened a Solid Waste Committee to monitor Augusta's plans for Hatch Hill and evaluate Whitefield's options if the landfill is closed. The Committee found that all alternatives to Hatch Hill would substantially increase disposal costs for the Town's residences and businesses.

Preliminary studies indicate that Augusta might be able to expand the landfill's capacity another eight years with a vertical expansion, but it will be technically difficult. At current fill rates Hatch Hill will be full in about three years. The City of Augusta plans to seek Maine Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) approval, design the new landfill cell, and construct it within this timeframe to prevent an interruption in solid waste disposal. This is a big challenge given the project's complexity. Augusta can increase the landfill's lifetime by excluding disposal by member communities such as Whitefield, and/or by reducing the volume of solid waste disposed of by each person using the landfill.

Following the Solid Waste Committee's report on disposal alternatives, the Select Board established the Solid Waste and Recycling Committee. The Committee's charges, and progress on them, are:

- 1. Explore the feasibility of improving composting and obtaining DEP grants for doing so. The Committee obtain a \$5000 Waste Diversion Grant from DEP to foster composting of food waste generated in Whitefield. The Committee will roll out the program this spring (2024).
- 2. Assist the Town with public education to promote recycling and composting. The Committee developed new signs for the Recycling Center to aid in appropriate recycling of rigid plastic and clothing. It also updated and published brochures on where to recycle unusual waste such as waste oil, batteries, printer cartridges, electronics and so forth. It placed a food scrap collection barrel at the recycle center. This spring (2024) it will sell discounted backyard composting bins and begin education and outreach on how to compost food scraps at home.
- 3. Assist the Town with collecting Municipal Solid Waste data and filing bi-annual MSW reports with the DEP. The Committee collects solid waste disposal and recycling data from waste haulers, Hatch Hill, and Lincoln County Recycling. This information was reported to DEP in 2023 and is being compiled for the 2025 report.

4. Prepare for municipal reimbursements under the State's new Expanded Producer Responsibility law. The DEP is developing regulations to carry out a new law that encourages producers of packaging to reduce the amount of packaging used and to make the packaging more recyclable. The law will also help fund Whitefield's recycling efforts provided our recycling program meets certain standards. The Committee is developing comments on the DEP rules that support the Town's interests.

WHITEFIELD RECYCLING

KITCHEN SCRAPS FOR COMPOSTING

The Whitefield Recycling Center now accepts kitchen scraps. Through a program run by Lincoln County Recycling, kitchen scraps can be collected and taken to a county-wide program in Wiscasset where they are composted along with yard wastes. While kitchen scraps do not represent a huge volume of household wastes, they are quite heavy and thus can be a significant part of solid waste disposal costs since tipping fees at the Hatch Hill landfill, where Whitefield's wastes go, are based on weight not volume. Additionally, kitchen scraps can become smelly in solid waste and attract all sorts of critters.

Here's how to sort kitchen scraps for composting

ACCEPTABLE	MATERIALS TO AVOID	
Fruits and vegetables, including fresh and dried, peels, skins and rinds	No liquids	
Egg shells and cooked eggs	No bones	
Grains, bread, and pasta, including dough, bakery items, oatmeal, rolls, all types of pasta	No meat, raw or cooked	
Hard cheeses and most soft cooked cheese (ie pizza)	No dairy (except hard or cooked cheeses), including milk, sour cream, ice cream, soy milk, cottage cheese, cheese sauce	
Cooked seafood and shells	No raw seafood	
Coffee grounds, tea bags, paper coffee filters	No fats, oils or greasy food	
Nut shells	No metals, plastics, glass, etc.	

Kitchen scraps may be brought to the Recycling Center and deposited in a barrel outside. If the barrel is empty, add about 6 inches of sawdust to the bottom of the barrel before adding your food wastes. Then after each person adds their food scarps, please sprinkle a small layer of sawdust on your deposit.

If you would like to have some finished compost for your gardens or plants, it can purchased from the County by the yard or by the bag. The facility is located on Hutoon Hill Road in Wiscasset.

Whitefield CHIP Program Report

Community Housing Improvement Project (CHIP, Inc.)

"Neighbors helping neighbors keep their homes safe, warm, and dry."

Several years ago when Lise Hanners was developing Whitefield Cares, she reached out to the Community Housing Improvement Project (CHIP, Inc) for more information. CHIP's relationship with the town of Whitefield has been growing ever since.

CHIP provides home repairs and fuel assistance to people experiencing hardship who are unable to stay safe, warm and dry in their own homes. Founded in 1984 on the Pemaquid Peninsula, CHIP has since grown to serve eleven towns of central and eastern Lincoln County.

Having that local link is valuable: it helps CHIP be more connected to Whitefield and Whitefield to be more aware of CHIP. Since that first contact with Lise, CHIP has included a Whitefield household every year as a recipient of services on Community Cares Day, a volunteer-based home repair event. On that day upwards of 75 people of all skill levels come out to help neighbors throughout the towns we serve. In return, Whitefield residents have joined this event, sharing their skills and bringing hope to their neighbors. In the past three years, volunteers have worked at three different households in Whitefield repairing skirting on mobile homes, rebuilding steps, and helping with yard work and trash removal.

These improvements make a physical difference for the families. But it also brings hope: a family knows that someone cares, that their lives matter. This goes both ways. Volunteers, too, reap the benefits of making a real difference in the lives of neighbors.

During the 2022-2023 fiscal year, CHIP spent over \$30,000 in Whitefield for materials, labor, and fuel costs. Together with volunteers, contractors and donors, CHIP helped 4 Whitefield families stay safe, warm and dry in their own homes with major and minor essential home repairs. During the coldest months, 28 Whitefield households received a supplemental fuel delivery of 100 gallons or 1 cord of firewood, or help with their electric bill. CHIP offers this benefit one time per season as a supplement to other critical fuel assistance programs such as the Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP).

CHIP also partners with Lincoln Academy to build window inserts for people who need them, as a way to reduce their heating costs.

Cemetery Committee Report

This year Barry Tibbetts worked with the Erskine Leos (associated with the Lions Club) at the Partridge Cemetery off the Doyle Road on their Day of Caring. They erected fence posts (milled out from trees cut at the Coopers Mills Cemetery in 2022) attached rope to the posts to delineate the cemetery boundaries, straightened and cleaned a veteran's gravestone, and cleaned up the cemetery. Thank you to Barry and the Erskine students.

The Coopers Mills Cemetery needed grounds maintenance and there is a trust fund to care for that cemetery. Dylan Peaslee was hired to:

- 1. Pave bottom drive where it meets the road up to where the driveway pavement runs out using reclaimed asphalt.
- Remove the uphill granite post by the vehicle entrance, regrade entrance and seed it for improved access. Post was saved and stored behind sexton's building.
- 3. Clean up and face with rocks the bank that was cut when Main Street was ditched to improve looks and prevent further erosion.
- 4. Properly ditch and pave the ditch on Main Street in front of the lower drive to prevent erosion.

The cost was \$1950 from Coopers Mills Cemetery funds for items one and two, items three and four came out of the roads budget.

A gravestone fell at the Coopers Mills Cemetery and Joe Ferrannini of Gravestone Matters, who has repaired gravestones for us in the past, repaired the stone at no cost when he was in the area.

The town agreed to hire Barry Tibbetts to prune overgrown bushes and clear back brush at Coopers Mills Cemetery. He then donated the money to purchase two cemetery signs, designed by Bill McKeen, for the Choate Cemetery on Rte. 126 and the Maple Hill Cemetery on the East River Road. Hopefully more signs can be erected in the future.

The Cemetery Committee pruned trees and cleared brush at the Woodman Cemetery off East River Road near the Alna town line in April.

The town provides flags for all veterans' graves and committee members place flags on veterans' graves in ten small cemeteries and Coopers Mills Cemetery each year. Flags are also supplied for the Whitefield Cemetery and St. Denis cemeteries. There are over 300 veterans buried in Whitefield. Libby Harmon continues to add to our knowledge of veterans as well information about other interesting past citizens.

Many of the small cemeteries in town have gravestones that need repair but there are no funds for this work. These cemeteries hold the history and ancestors of our town. We hope to find the money needed to properly care for these graves as well.

Cemetery Committee Report cont.

Donations could also go towards erecting signs with the cemetery names as is done in many other towns.

The Cemetery Committee makes recommendations to the Board for properly caring for veterans' graves in town and use of dedicated cemetery funds to meet the Towns obligations in maintaining the cemeteries that fall under the Towns responsibility. This includes all cemeteries in Town except the Whitefield Cemetery and St. Denis cemeteries.

The Cemetery Committee meets quarterly on the first Wednesday of January, April, June and October at 10 am at the Central Fire Station.

Whitefield Trails Committee Report

10 Years on the Whitefield Trails!

In the summer of 2014, the fledgling Whitefield Trails group held a grand opening of their first success, the Marr's Ridge Trail on the middle Hunt's Meadow Road. There are now six locations around town with public access for getting outside to enjoy the spectacular beauty of the fields, woods, ponds and rivers in Whitefield. Our strong partner in this journey, Midcoast Conservancy, helps with mapping and signage, volunteer recruitment and an online presence for the trails. You can read about the trails in Whitefield and print off maps and descriptions at www.midcoastconservancy.org/sheepscot-valley.

Two Whitefield trails cross portions of conservation easements held by Midcoast Conservancy. We thank landowners Eli and Anna Troyer and Sandy Benne for their cooperation. The **Happy Farm River Trail** that starts at the Recycling Center is partially on Troyer property, and other private landowners allow access to the large oxbow section of the river and across some working fields. **The Marrs Ridge Trail** on the middle Hunts Meadow Road is on Benne's property, featuring his granite sculptures high on the ridge.

Two other trails are on property owned by Midcoast Conservancy. The spur which goes upstream along the **West Branch of the Sheepscot at the Salmon Preserve** on the North Howe Road was developed by the Whitefield Trails group in 2017. The most recent trail in Whitefield, opened in 2020, winds across the **Maguire Preserve**. The property stretches from the Heath Road east to Weary Pond. A round-trip walk out to the pond and back is almost 4 miles, through mixed woods, over several streams, along a large vernal pool and a multi-tiered ledge waterfall.

The Whitefield Trails group also maintains two town properties: The park at the Cooper's Mills Dam site, and the Olsen Preserve, an 18-acre field by the West Branch of the Sheepscot River just south of Rte. 17 on Fox Farm Lane. Thanks to Whitefield Lions Club member Barry Tibbetts and young volunteers from the Whitefield School Day of Caring and the Erskine Academy Leos, these fields now have walking paths laid with wood chips for easier access to the West Branch of the Sheepscot. It's a great place for walking, snowshoeing, skiing, or just enjoying the views from a bench by the river. The Town of Whitefield keeps the lot plowed in winter. When you visit, please respect the privacy of adjoining landowners and drive on Fox Farm Lane only as far as the parking lot on the right at the beginning of the road.

Whitefield Food Pantry Report

The Whitefield Food Pantry continues to steadily increase the number of households we serve. Currently we serve an average of 65 households a month, about 200 people. Some come every week, some once a month. We are thankful that we can allow people to come as often as they feel the need, and they are able to take us much as they need.

We are so grateful to the many individuals, organizations and businesses that help us keep our shelves stocked. To mention a few: The Ecumenical Food Pantry in Newcastle yearly provides Thanksgiving Baskets to those who request (via Food Pantry or Town Office). This year they provided 57 baskets to clients of the Whitefield Food Pantry, at no cost to us. This is truly a blessing to our pantry as well as our people: CW Repair in Pittston yearly collects non-perishables for the Whitefield Food Pantry which fills the back of a pick up truck. The variety we receive is very welcome. Most of our fresh produce comes from Twin Village Farm in Damariscotta, as well as local farmers.

I am so grateful to the many volunteers that do the tasks that keep us operational, including but not limited to: Pick up donations from Hannaford, Twin Village, Sheepscot General Farm and Store; unload Good Sheperd Food Bank deliveries; set up and clean up; pleasantly greet and assist our clients.

The Food Pantry is located in the basement of the Calvary Bible Baptist Church, 150 Grand Army Road, Whitefield. We are open the first Friday of the month 10-2 pm, and every Saturday (except following the first Friday) from 10-12 pm. Clients are welcome to come as often as they need.

The pantry is a 501c3 organization.

Kings Mills Union Hall Association Report

Conceived in 1899 with help from the Grange, the Union Hall located in Kings Mills opened its doors in 1901 as the "Whitefield Fish and Game Club". The Hall was well known for its school lunch program, memorable suppers, hunters' breakfasts, the Fourth of July White Elephant Sale, dances, theatrical performances, horse shows, and other community events. What follows is an abbreviated history of the Hall. A more detailed history including credits can be found in previous town reports.

1990 In order to preserve the Hall, it was jacked up, deteriorating joists repaired, the structure placed on new concrete pilings, and front and rear foundation walls. This was followed by a period of little utilization of this prominent landmark and the structure began to show signs of neglect.

2007 A dedicated core of townspeople set a goal to restore this building to its original grandeur through a variety of fundraising efforts. The organization became incorporated as Kings Mills Union Hall Association (KMUHA). Later that year the building was placed on the National Register of Historic Places.

2013 A replica of the original front door was built and installed.

2014 A new metal roof in the likeness of the old one was completed

2016 A new waterline was run under the road from the wellhead at the fire station and connected directly to a new kitchen water hydrant in the Hall. In the fall the front facade was graced with a replica of the original sign.

2018 Land acquisition to the north and west moved us forward in setting new goals.

2019 With help of a Maine Foundation grant, two new Rinnai heaters were installed and the huge old oil furnace and duct work was removed bringing the hall back to its former interior appearance. Tree removal and further clean up were done on the newly acquired land.

2020 The Covid-19 pandemic caused all annual events/fundraisers to be put on hold; The Fourth of July White Elephant Sale, Annual Craft Fair, Ham, Baked Beans, Mac 'n Cheese Supper, Chicken Pie Supper, September Annual Meeting/Open House, and Traditional Christmas Party with tree lighting and Santa's annual visit to the children.

2021 Our doors remained closed as the pandemic continued to fall and rise. Stumping and clearing of the land north of the Hall was done. A waterline shut off valve/curb stop was installed, as well as a new commercial kitchen faucet/sprayer. A VERY successful Chicken Pie Sale was held in November with 112 scratch-made organic chicken pies sold.

2022 With the return of the Kings Mills Fourth of July celebration, the White Elephant Sale came back to life. A septic tank with pump chamber was installed. The second Chicken Pie Sale was held and the old ten (10) burner, two (2) ovens commercial stove was replaced with a brand new one.

2023 Regular meetings resumed in April. The Town voted to appropriate \$10,000 of ARPA funds to KMUHA which enabled the completion of the septic system leach field by David Jackson. Thanks David! This will allow an ADA handicap accessible bathroom to be installed in the ell. The original privy will remain functional, and Lynn Talacko is working on the design. The traditional Chicken Pie Supper was held in November and organic chickens were again donated by Common Wealth Poultry Co. in Gardiner; thanks Ryan Wilson, Sheepscot General, and everyone else who donated produce and their time.

The response to the return of this traditional event was one of palpable joy and community. KMUHA is collaborating with the Whitefield Library while they are undergoing construction on their second floor. We are storing numerous items in our hall upstairs, including their stage curtain which now sits along side ours. Finally, instead of holding the Christmas Open House, it was decided that making the children's gift bags to donate to the Whitefield Food Pantry where they were handed out to families with children, along with handmade hats and mittens, was the best use of our resources for those with the greatest need. The gifts were met with lots of joy and appreciation. Window lights graced the Hall and a Christmas tree donated by Cathey and Louie Sell, was lit with little white lights, giving the Kings Mills village a festive appearance and peaceful beauty during this Christmas Season. Again, thank you Cathey and Louie for your gift.

We are always looking for new members interested in supporting the preservation of the Hall. If you have questions, please call Jennifer Grady, President at 549-3170. Annual membership remains \$10 per year, due at the annual meeting, usually held the last Sunday in September. Watch for our sandwich boards and posters for future events and come join in the fun.

Whitefield Historical Society Report

On March 19th, the Whitefield Historical Society presented "History of the Whitefield Library Building". Gathered in the Whitefield Fire Department's conference room, the audience heard three narratives about the building's evolution: its origin as the Grand Army of the Republic (GAR) Hall, Erskine Post #24, to the Arlington



Grange Hall and presently to the Whitefield Library. Bill McKeen presented the GAR material, JoAnn Mooney read a Grange memoir and Cheryle Joslyn showed a photo essay on the renovation process.

For the Memorial Day Program, we moved back into the Town House after the flag raising ceremony. In that traditional setting, the audience heard more about the Erskine family, especially Mr. Christopher Erskine, Corporeal in the Civil War, who was fatally injured during the Battle of Gettysburg. His widow, Abigail, and their children were taken in by her in-laws on the Head Tide Road. Some of their descendants attended the program and our first fund raising efforts for a bronze plague that will be installed at the Library.

In October, we gave our 2023 Day of Remembrance program, "Apples and Taxes". Stories were told illustrating the importance of apples to the average Whitefield homestead in the last century and a half. Today, we buy a bag of apples at the shopping center. Back then, the fruit was stored carefully in earthen cellars and wooden barrels. They were grown both for nutrition and economic purposes – such as the barrels of apples that were sold by the Bailey, Mooney and Tibbetts families to name a few. Local apples from Bailey's Orchard were provided as snacks at this program as were homemade apple squares made from an old Bailey recipe.

Again in 2023, thanks to the Town and the Whitefield Fire Department, the March and October programs were held in their conference room. In addition to these 2023 programs, progress was made toward future lighting improvements and shelving. Added to regular meetings were work sessions to prepare the space – while continuing with archiving efforts and newsletters. A new design was completed for the shelving reconfiguration and thanks to the award of American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds an electrician has been retained to complete the new lighting in the first quarter of 2024. Administratively, membership has held steady, and it was voted to hold meetings on Tuesdays, to avoid conflicts with holiday weekends.

On behalf of Whitefield Library's Board of Directors, staff, volunteers and patrons, thank you for the many ways that you have supported our library this past year. We would not be where we are without our community! The accomplishments for 2023 are many, and that long list would roll down Grand Army Hill and over the bridge, so we'll spare you that! Let's just say, every day, there's been something new and exciting happening at the library.

On January 14th, we celebrated our 2 year anniversary of the day that we opened our doors and welcomed our community back in to use our beautifully restored 1st floor library space. With scoops of ice cream and hot chocolate on a chilly January weekend, we welcomed friends and neighbors, and gratefully celebrated being two!

Experts in the field will tell you that some of the challenges that parents face with two year olds are "developmentally normal". However, parents can attest that comment oftentimes didn't help one bit! There has been very little "normal" feeling about some of the challenges we've faced. However, one of the biggest is now behind us. We've had an eager eye on becoming part of the Maine State Library network from the birth of our association in 2018, from the moment of purchasing this old

- -assist in monitoring server logs and events
- -provide assistance in use of equipment and software to patrons and staff
- -set up and monitor Zoom meetings for staff and patrons to attend meetings and programs virtually
- -create library cards for patrons
- -chair Technology Team

Our brain is still growing, and we get frustrated sometimes when we discover that there's still more to do, but we have the most generous community of volunteers who come together to resolve and accomplish what needs to be taken care of. A snapshot of Erskine Academy's 2022-2023 educational program includes:

- Erskine Academy is approved for state tuition through the Maine Department of Education (MDOE) and accredited by the New England Association of Schools and Colleges (NEASC). The thorough accreditation process occurs every ten years, with Erskine Academy's decennial visits beginning in the spring of 2025.
- · Enrollment of 557 students in grades nine through twelve from 16 local towns.
- 33% of Erskine Academy students qualify for reduced or free lunch.
- A 12:1 student-to-teacher ratio
- A 99% graduation rate
- Of 123 graduates in 2023, 100% graduated with a viable and accessible post-secondary plan. Plans included higher or continuing education in 4 and 2-year programs, many to highly selective colleges and universities (81%); apprenticeships with local companies (17%), and military service (2%).
- Erskine Academy offered 85 total courses in the 2022-2023 academic year.
- Erskine Academy offered 9 Advanced Placement (AP) courses that enrolled <u>124</u> students.
- Erskine Academy offered 12 Dual-Enrollment college courses that enrolled <u>281</u> students.
- 662 free college courses were successfully completed at Erskine Academy by students still in high school from 2020-2022, representing roughly \$794,500 saved by local students and families.
- 68 students (29%) attended the Capital Area Technical Center (CATC), gaining knowledge in the skilled trades and earning certificates toward competency.
- Erskine Academy has a plethora of student activities and clubs. With 32 athletic teams
 over three seasons and 23 clubs and activities available, <u>ALL</u> students find themselves
 involved and part of Erskine Academy's vibrant student life.

I offer my sincerest gratitude to the residents of Whitefield for upholding the valuable opportunity of high school choice for your youth and families—a privilege coveted by many and accessible to only approximately 3% of Maine students. We cherish the value of school choice and never take for granted the responsibility parents place upon us by choosing Erskine Academy for their child's high school placement. Families who have selected Erskine Academy have put their trust in our school's faculty and staff, allowing us to play a pivotal role in fostering their child's intellectual, social, and personal growth. Lincoln Academy 2024 Annual Report for Sending Towns

To the Residents of Lincoln Academy's Sending Towns,

Thank you for your continuing support of Lincoln Academy, an independent school serving students from midcoast towns since our founding in 1801. The school is thriving thanks to our supportive community, vibrant and diverse student body, and hardworking faculty and staff.

Lincoln Academy "By the numbers"

- 25% of LA students qualified for free & reduced lunch (underreported since lunch is free for everyone)
- 20% of juniors and seniors attend vocational programming at BRCTC
- 18% of LA students take one or more AP classes during their years at LA
- 54% of LA students play at least one sport
- 23% participate in band, choir, and/or theater programs

2023-24 Facilities Upgrades:

LA's historic bell tower is scheduled for structural repairs. The bell itself is currently being refurbished by Elderhorst Bell Company in Pennsylvania. The belfry and tower will be shored up, starting with the foundation, before we return the bell to its traditional perch.

In the summer of 2024 we will replace the light poles on the William Clark field. The new lights will be more energy efficient and throw off less light pollution during night games, and a new sound system will be integrated into the new poles.

Enrollment: 564 Students from 21 Towns and 13 Countries

Enrollment numbers have been positive, with our current ninth grade class size exceeding last year's predictions. Next year's incoming class (the class of 2028) is expected to be very close in number to the graduating Class of 2024, and we anticipate total day student enrollment to remain consistent next year. The residential program continues to grow, and we expect to have over 40 international and domestic students in the dorm next year.

<u>Academics:</u> Lincoln Academy offers 135 classes, including over 40 STEM classes, more than 30 Performing and Visual Arts classes, 33 Advanced Placement (AP) and honors classes, and 11 vocational certificate programs through the Bath Regional Career and Technical Center (BRCTC).

<u>Athletics:</u> In 2023 LA sports teams won conference championships in both boys and girls tennis, girls track, boys soccer, and both boys and girls cross country. We had seven KVAC Coach of the year awards, three Good Sportsmanship awards, and school records broken in track and field. Individual athletes won KVAC

championships in wrestling, swimming, track and field, and cross country. Roan Donaghy '25 of Damariscotta won the Class B State Championship in Racewalk, and Kellen Adickes '25 of Bristol won the New England Golf Championship.

Performing Arts: The theater program staged seven sold-out performances of *The Crucible* in the fall of 2023. 13 musicians (including band, choir, jazz, and orchestra) qualified for All-State music festivals, while 45 qualified for District III Honors music festival.

Of the 149 graduates in the class of 2023:

- 74 enrolled in 4-year colleges
- 39 enrolled in 2-year colleges
- 34 entered the workforce
- 2 entered the military

One member of the class was a National Merit Semifinalists and 44 were AP Scholars. Graduates were awarded over \$350,000 in scholarships through Lincoln Academy, local, statewide, and national foundations.

Faculty Credentials

- 57% of Lincoln Academy faculty have their Master's or other advanced degree
- 4 faculty members have gone beyond state certification to become Nationally Teacher Certified Teachers

Career Preparation

- The Second Annual Peter J. Benner Job Fair hosted 30 local businesses with immediate openings for employment. Some students were hired on the spot! The third annual Job Fair is planned for April 3, 2024.
- A weekly Career Exploration Series is currently underway, bringing professionals to campus to meet with students and discuss a wide variety of career paths.
- The online <u>Jobs Board</u> connected dozens of students and recent graduates with summer and year-round jobs at local businesses and organizations.

2023 Annual Report

Greetings,

As I begin my twenty-second year I want to once again thank you for the opportunity to serve as the Lincoln County Sheriff. During my time in office I have been privileged to find myself surrounded by men and women working hard every day to provide the best possible public safety services for each of you.

During the past several years some of my toughest challenges have been staffing during a period when greater accountability and transparency have been expected, while the interest in those seeking a career in public safety seems to have diminished.

Despite these challenges, I have worked hard with our County Commissioners to develop policies and practices to attract and retain employees to Lincoln County. I did this while being the first Sheriff in Maine to begin a Citizens Advisory Board with a goal of improving our transparency and providing valuable insight and opinions as we work to improve policy during a law enforcement accreditation process.

I am happy to report that I expect that in early 2024 the staffing level at the Sheriff's Office will have reached a point that will allow us to be more proactive with the public safety we provide without adding any additional positions to the budget. Planning has begun to put in place a Deputy to provide dedicated traffic enforcement in areas of high crash and complaints. Traffic complaints are one of the most common concerns I hear in the community. I hope by assigning a Deputy to this position we can improve traffic safety and better respond to the concerns I have been hearing for many years.

Additionally, I hope to assign another Deputy to a position of Community Resource Deputy. This Deputy's primary focus will be building relationships with those vulnerable populations in Lincoln County that are at high risk or often subject to crime. I anticipate that by building relationships with these vulnerable populations (elderly, children, mentally ill, substance use disorder, domestic violence

etc.) the Deputy can begin working on strategies to reduce crime and make our County a safer place to live.

I look forward to serving you again in 2024 and once again want to thank you for the opportunity to serve as your Sheriff.

Dear Friends:

It is an honor to serve the people of Maine in the U.S. Senate, and I welcome this opportunity to share an update on issues important to Maine and America.

One of my priorities for 2023 has been to improve the appropriations process in Congress – the way it decides how to spend taxpayer money. I took over as the Vice Chair of the Senate Appropriations Committee last year. Along with Chair Patty Murray, we decided the best change we could make was not to do something new. Instead, it was to do something old – that is, go back to the regular and transparent committee process that we used to have.

Part of restoring this process included holding 50 public Committee hearings, which allowed for input from senators on both sides of the aisle. As a result, for the first time in five years, the Senate Appropriations Committee passed all twelve of its funding bills on time. This was done with strong bipartisan support. In fact, seven of them passed unanimously.

Now, we need to work with the House of Representatives to pass these twelve bills and turn them into laws.

These bills contain funding for a wide range of Maine priorities, including support for the workforce at Bath Iron Works and Portsmouth Naval Shipyard, our lobster industry, infrastructure improvements, affordable housing, biomedical research, veterans, and heating assistance programs like LIHEAP. These bills also contain nearly \$590 million in Congressionally Directed Spending for 231 projects throughout the State of Maine. These projects would help promote job creation, expand access to health care, and improve public safety, infrastructure, and important resources in communities across all 16 counties of our state. I will continue to work to get these bills signed into law in the new year.

On October 25, the horrific mass shooting in Lewiston claimed the lives of 18 Mainers and injured 13 others. In response, I led Maine's Congressional Delegation in requesting an independent investigation by the U.S. Army Inspector General into the events leading up to the shooting. On December 15, the Under Secretary of the Army wrote to inform me that such an investigation will take place, and the Army Inspector General has instructed her team to immediately begin preparing to conduct this investigation. While nothing can undo the events of October 25, I will continue to work to understand what happened and what could have been done differently, and to find answers for the victims, survivors, and their families.

Dear Friends and Neighbors,

I must once again thank the residents of Whitefield for giving me the opportunity to serve as your State Representative and participate in what I believe is an incredible adventure. Serving as a Freshman Representative in the 131st Legislature has proven to be an intense learning experience. The 131st Legislature has completed its first regular session and first special session. Between these two sessions the legislature processed 2,019 bills.

The majority of my effort was spent on the Joint Standing Committee for Education and Cultural Affairs. This committee held public hearings and work sessions on 213 bills. I attempted to approach each bill with an open mind and listen attentively to each person testifying. The question I ask is: How does this bill affect you, the constituents in my district? I'm there to represent all of you.

With significant increases in tax revenues the Legislature chose to grow state government rather than reform the income tax structure and help us all with the challenges we face due to inflation. The Legislature repealed the *Property Tax Stabilization Act* rather than adopt revisions that would benefit our seniors, especially those with a fixed income. High energy costs continue to plague us and continue to deter industry from coming to Maine. The proposed statuatory changes were not adopted by the Legislature. Reducing those costs will not only have a positive effect on our cost of living, but will also make our state more attractive to those high energy consuming industries.

The second session is scheduled to convene on January 3, 2024. I encourage you to participate in your state government, local government and school board. Pursuant to Title 21-A, Section 759(7), absentee ballots will be processed at the polls at the following times of 5:00 PM and 7:00 PM.

And to notify and warn said voters to assemble for the business meeting at the **Whitefield Elementary School** located at 164 Grand Army Road in said Town of Whitefield on Saturday the **Sixteenth day of March 2024 at 10:00 AM**, then and there to act on Articles 3 through 44 as set out below, to wit:

Article 1: To elect a **Moderator** by written ballot to preside at said meeting.

Article 2: To elect by secret ballot municipal officials namely, one Select Board
Member/Assessor/Overseer of the Poor; two Planning Board
Members; one RSU 12 School Board Member, all for three-year

terms.

Article 3: To see if the Town will fix dates when taxes shall be due and payable, and to see if the Town will fix an annual interest rate to be charged on unpaid taxes after said dates, and to allow the Tax Collector or Treasurer to accept the prepayment of taxes not yet committed, pursuant to 36 M.R.S. §506, amount not to exceed previous year's taxes. Interest on any prepayments will be zero percent. 23/24 budget year interest rate 5%.

SELECT BOARD RECOMMENDS APPROVAL OF: Taxes due Friday, November 29, 2024 and Tuesday, April 29, 2025 and a 5% interest rate for unpaid taxes.

- only taxpayers who do not have any outstanding tax obligations for prior tax years are eligible to participate in the tax club program;
- taxpayers wishing to participate in a tax club for a particular property tax year shall enter into an agreement with the town by a publicly advertised deadline determined by the Town Tax Collector.

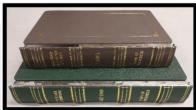

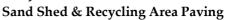
